## Fairytale house a whimsical landmark

Find yourself in a fairytale when traveling down Mill Street in Raymond. There lies The House That Jack Built, a peculiar town landmark that transports you into the world of a child's imagination.

The House That Jack Built has a distinctive look that stands out amongst the rest of the houses within Raymond Village. It has playful yellow-colored walls with cyan blue framing around its doorways and windows. The house is built to look crooked, resembling an imperfect, yet magical children's drawing.

To people passing by, its presence is a mystery. However, to many locals who have lived in Raymond for years, it is a nostalgic memory and sentimental reminder of their past.

The House That Jack Built was not created by Jack but was originally constructed in the 1930s by the Foster family of Raymond. Its fantastical look is inspired by the nursery rhyme that was favored by their daughter, The House That Jack Built.

The Fosters had opened an ice cream parlor and tea shop within the building, where they sold a variety of knick-knacks in their Maine-inspired gift shop. Some of their products included moccasins and maple syrup products. They also had their own

soda fountain within the parlor.

Lucy Foster, also a former teacher, was often seen working within the shop. Many today still have very high regard for her heartfelt dedication to her students and her community. Don Foster, who also owned the business, was said to be "quite the character and funny" during his time working in the shop.

This used to be a very popular destination, as Route 302 originally ran past The House That Jack Built, before it was redirected to go by Raymond Beach in 1955.

The ice cream parlor was a favorite spot for teenagers during the time it was open. It was "the place to be" for local teens to hang out and socialize with their friends.

One customer reminiscing about the business, says "It sure was a popular place and one all the teens in the 50's loved." Another said, "I had my first banana split there."

Many of the teens who used to frequent the ice cream parlor would often sign their names on the walls within the interior. The list of those names gives a unique glimpse into the past of those who used to call this their hangout when they were young.

The business within The House That Jack Built was open for around 25 years before it eventually closed. The property was then sold by the Fosters to the Timmons family.

Even though the business that brought so many teenagers fond memories had closed, The House That Jack Built continued

to remain in many locals' hearts.

Alice Bradeen, secretary for the Raymond-Casco Historical Society, grew up right next to the house. She was close with the Timmons family, who were residing on the property at the time. She spent many of her days exploring and playing there.

She described how there was also a wishing well added on to the back of the property. It was something that

### Public Safety memorial a tribute to first responders

When Windham's first responders and public safety members moved into their newly remodeled building on Gray Road in 2022, something was missing. Plans had been underway for several years to create and place a monument outside the building as a tribute to those who render assistance to the public when emergencies arise, put out fires, and keep residents safe 24 hours a day.

Lengthy delays from the monument company prevented that from happening, but on Memorial Day, Windham's Public Safety Memorial was unveiled and dedicated outside the facility. The monument recognizes the contributions that police officers and firefighters have made to the town through decades of service and is intended as a permanent way to say thanks to those who have served as a member of Windham Fire/Rescue, Police, Rescue Association, or as a dispatcher for the Town of Windham.

Surrounding the monument is a courtyard made up of benches to sit and reflect and special brick paver stones for families of first responders. The monument itself is black granite and stands 6 feet in height with white lettering and contains logos of the Windham Police and the Windham Fire/Rescue Departments, an eagle,

and the American flag. Space is available on the monument to memorialize the names of police officers or firefighters should they perish in the line of duty in the future.

During the dedication event, Windham Police Chief Kevin Schofield and Windham Fire/Rescue Chief Brent Libby shared their thoughts about the monument.

"Today's activities are the culmination of two to twoand-a-half years of work," Schofield said. "This recognizes people in public service to the community, and it means a great deal to all of us."

Schofield introduced Karen Lewsen, the wife of the late former Windham Police Chief Richard B. "Rick" Lewsen Jr., whom he replaced as top law enforcement officer for the town in 2015. A granite bench in the courtyard is The new Windham Public Safety Memorial who died in 2022.

"Our goal is to dedicate and unveil this monument as a tribute and remembrance," Libby said. "The space on the monument is reserved for those who give the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty, but it hasn't happened, and we're committed to keeping it that way."

Libby also pointed out that another of the black granite benches in the courtyard is inscribed "Honor Valor Sacrifice" and he said that exemplifies the mindset of everyone who serves as a firefighter, police officer, or emergency medical technician in Windham.

"Those are core tenets that police and firefighters live by every day," Libby said.

Rev. Tim Higgins of St. Ann's Episcopal Church said he recognizes

# Hi-fi remorse and new beginnings

Throughout my life, I've heard that you never really miss something until it's gone. I'm here to tell you it's true, and I've decided to do something about that.

This story started a few years ago. A fellow who worked in the same building was creating a stereo system for the warehouse he worked in. I happened to have my old stereo sitting on my back porch for several years gathering dust. I asked him if he wanted it, and he said yes. I boxed it up and hauled it to him a few days later. He thanked me and I left.

The next time I saw him during the following week, I asked how the stereo was working for him. He told me it was not something he wanted so he had thrown it in the dumpster, and it had been hauled away. I was upset and it's eaten away at me for two years.

About a month ago, I told my wife that I was going to try and rebuild my system if I could find the components. When I started looking online, I found a few good deals. Someone who lived about 10 minutes away was selling a Bose Acoutimass 3 speaker set. But instead of paying \$1,000 like I had for the exact same set at Best Buy in 1991, this set was slightly used, but only cost \$75. I then purchased the same model Sansui CD player as I had previously owned for \$40 on eBay, and that's also where I found the same model Sansui cassette deck that I had purchased in Germany in 1979. This time though instead

of \$250, I paid just \$50.

Back in 1991, when I was relocating across the country, I had also made the decision to ditch my turntable as record albums were not only heavy to move but were becoming a thing of the past as CDs were all the rage. At that time, it was devastating to part with more than 500 record albums, but I gave them all away. I had been collecting albums since I was first in college and many of them are now considered to be classics and worth a considerable sum if I still had them. But I had made my decision way back when and after moving it was years before I saw new record albums for sale anywhere.

When I first obtained my stereo system from the Base Exchange while serving in the Air Force in Germany, a particular kind of turntable had caught my eye, but in 1978 I simply couldn't have afforded it on my Air Force salary of \$360 a month. It was a Technics linear turntable without a tone arm. The turntable's stylus is contained in an electronic unit that sweeps across the album and senses precisely where the tracks are.

This time, however, I was able to find a pristine Technics linear turntable from about 1982 in near mint condition. That set me back \$200, but when it arrived carefully packed via Fed Ex, I was over the moon. About the same time, my wife had found an old box left in the basement by the previous owners of our home twice removed or so. We opened the box and inside were about 150 old 45 rpm records from the 1960s and 1970s, including some from The Beatles, The Four Seasons, Neil Diamond, Linda Ronstadt, and Elton John. That led me to order a 45-rpm adapter for my new linear turntable.

The last piece of the component puzzle for me was the biggest challenge. I wanted to find the exact same Sansui receiver as I had previously owned. I searched for weeks on eBay without much success. That type of vintage Sansui receiver remains in hot demand from stereo enthusiasts worldwide and the few available on eBay were selling for \$1,000 or more.

After a lengthy search, I found the one I wanted up for sale at a stereo shop in Massachusetts on a website called Reverb. The shop's technicians had cleaned it thoroughly inside and out and reconditioned it to work as if it were brand new. I paid \$500 and am looking forward to having it shipped to me this week.

Finding vinyl records to play on it is a different matter though. Since I last purchased a vinyl recording in the 1980s, the price seems to have almost quadrupled. What used to be \$7.99 is now \$29 and \$30. I've recently visited two Goodwill stores looking at the vinyl albums they have for sale and found two that I purchased for a total of \$2. One of those was a 1965 pressing of Gene Pitney's Greatest Hits. But most of their selection on display were albums my

father would have preferred such as Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass or the Ray Coniff Singers.

I plan on researching smaller nearby second-hand record shops to see what vinyl treasures I can find there. I'm also now looking for a stereo stand to put my components together and hook everything up.

Of course it may not be the same, but hopefully even better this time.

"Any donation goes to support our clients," said Director of Strategic Relations Lorianne Saniuk. "Broken out fundraising efforts can go to 100 different things. Fundraising goes into our general budget for the year. With that the gift makes everything possible at the Dempsey Center. I know their coach really wanted them to see the 'why' of the center and they were in awe. We want them to continue to support and act as ambassadors and if they know of someone with a cancer diagnosis can suggest the Dempsey Center for support."

they have to play a game they love and use that to benefit the community. The team embraced the Dempsey Center and all they do for those affected by cancer. Seniors had an informational tour of the Lewiston location. The team wore pink jerseys on May 17 to embrace cancer research and the team bought four jerseys which they have been raffling off for every \$5 donation with every dime going directly to the center.

"The main goal of the Dempsey Center is to help those affected by cancer and give them the services and goods that they need to have the best life that they can," said Windham senior Finn Smith. "They offer things like massages, acupuncture, wigs, they're entirely fundraising-based – things like this are really important. A couple of our players, me included,

have been affected by cancer in our

lives. It's really great to raise that substantial amount of money for an organization."

Windham senior Jake Lord said the fundraising really brought the team together and helped them become stronger.

"It was also pretty cool to play for something bigger than ourselves which was cancer awareness," said Windham senior Tobias Perkins. "That means a lot to me and other players on the team who have friends and family who were directly affected. It really makes you think about the things you do with your money and how they can be used to benefit someone in need ... anything helps and it's really wonderful to see."

### New citizens take Oath of Allegiance to U.S. in Windham

It was an emotional and highly anticipated event for 21 applicants as they raised their right hand and took the Oath of Allegiance becoming new American citizens during a U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services Naturalization Ceremony held at the Windham Veterans Center on May 24.

Hailing from 20 different nations, those taking the oath at the event successfully met the requirements to become an American citizen, including residing in the United States for at least five years, be at least age 18, demonstrate the ability to read, write and speak basic English, be of good moral character, pass an examination covering U.S. history and government, and swear loyalty to the U.S. by taking the Oath of Allegiance. This group joins 878,500 other applicants who have successfully become U.S. citizens in the past year nationwide.

The new citizens were welcomed to the event by Sergeant James Barlow of

Raymond, who serves in the Maine National Guard. He described how he left his home in Manchester, England and traveled across the Atlantic Ocean to become an American citizen.

Barlow went on to earn a college degree at Saint Joseph's College of Maine and said he wanted to give back to America, so he joined the Maine National Guard where he serves as a recruiter.

"You have no limitations, the sky is the limit," Barlow told the new citizens. "Be inspired, that is the mindset. This opens a new world for you."

Ciaran Gill of South Portland, 35, was one of the applicants being sworn in at the event as a new American citizen. He is originally from Australia and met his American wife, Alexandra Meyer, 12 years ago in Australia. The couple returned to Maine five years ago and Gill works for Idex in Portland.

Starting the process to become a U.S. citizen was something that Gill has strived to achieve for the past few years.

"We have made a permanent life here and to formalize it by doing this is a

huge step," Gill said. "The significance of this will probably sink in later today and in the coming weeks."

According to Gill, passing the citizenship examination was not a difficult challenge for him.

"I love history and geography, so it was a fun test," he said.

Meyer said she was proud of her husband for overcoming the various hurdles and requirements to citizenship.

"It's exciting for him to now be able

to vote and becoming a U.S. citizen also means he can receive a U.S. passport," she said.

State Rep. Barbara Bagshaw of Windham was the keynote speaker at the naturalization ceremony and in her address to the new citizens she quoted remarks made by former U.S. President Donald Trump at a Naturalization Ceremony at the White House in 2019.

"There is no higher honor or greater privilege than becoming an American citizen. Our whole nation embraces you with open arms and joyful hearts," Bagshaw said.

Music for the ceremony was provided by the Raymond Elementary School Chorus who performed "The Star Spangled Banner," along with "America the Beautiful," "You're a Grand Old Flag" and "This Pretty Planet."

Also attending the event was State Senator Tim Nangle of Windham, State Rep. Jane Pringle of Windham, and American Legion Field -Allen Post 148 Commander Tom Theriault.

The Oath of Allegiance was administered to the new citizens by Erika Grunnet, acting Field Office Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services in Portland. Greg Marchand, UCCIS Operations Support Specialist, served as master of ceremonies for the Naturalization Ceremony.

Refreshments were provided by the American Legion Post 148 Auxiliary. <

### ATTENTION: RAYMOND CITIZENS

Town government in Raymond has lost its citizen involvement, its integrity, and its transparency.

As a member of the duly elected Budget-Finance Committee for the last three annual Town budgets, I have had an 'up-close and personal' involvement observing the Town's Select Board budget process. I'm intentionally calling it the "Select Board process" because they didn't take one suggestion from any member of our Committee and didn't offer you, the citizen, an annual open public meeting to express your opinions.

The process has been surprising, at times shocking, and very much frustrating not only to me but every town citizen on the Budget-Finance Committee. We were elected and empowered by written ordinance to oversee and research the financial components of the town's government - to serve as a 'financial check and balance' to the Board.

This year has been especially difficult – the Select Board proposed Referendum X for the construction of a new Public Works facility at an estimated cost of \$8,100,000 (with estimated bond interest). Importantly, the normal Town standard practice for new facility construction was not followed - no neutral current space analysis or needs assessment, no use of a citizens' building committee, the delay of information being provided to the Budget-Finance Committee, and ultimately the Select Board's refusal to consider any of our committee's concerns or recommendations. These issues were sufficient enough to have the Budget-Finance Committee unanimously vote to reject Referendum X on the June 11 ballot.

Our committee, by town ordinance, is required to vote in your interest and with integrity. We didn't try and sway each other before our vote - we came to independent conclusions and then unanimously voted against the Select Board's recommendation. It was a historic vote – never had there been a unanimous vote against the Select Board's recommendation since the ordinance was created in 1980. Budget-Finance Chair Karen Lockwood read her reasons for the recommendation of "No" on Referendum X, which was a summary of every members' concerns and feelings. Knowing the Board would be upset wasn't our concern and some of us weren't surprised by the verbal and public abuse at the next meeting by Board Chair Bruno.

At the following Select Board meeting, the Board nullified our committee's vote to oppose Referendum X as "against recommendation" with the words, "no recommendation" citing the slightest of errors regarding the vote. I urge you to listen to the "Emergency Meeting of The Budget and Finance" this past April 11th (available at www.raymondmaine.org and at www.denismorse.me.) We need to bring transparency and integrity back to Town government.

I would personally and humbly ask you to take the time to vote for me on June 11th or by absentee ballot (now available at the Town Hall). I truly know it is time for the change to start.

"We fully support the candidacy of Denis Morse for the Select Board of Raymond. We very much appreciate his belief in the necessity of open communication as a bedrock of good government. We have lost that part of our government over the past years and Denis' experiences in government during the past 20 years will help to restore the responsive type of government that we used to have in this Town. Denis will be a strong voice on the Select Board and we sincerely ask that you explore his website to get more info on his positions and support him on June 11."

# Science experiments chart new path for students at Manchester School

Small steps are being made by students for another giant leap for mankind. This spring, six teams from Manchester School in Windham participated in the Plant the Moon and Plant Mars challenge, a global science experiment and inspirational project-based-learning challenge to see who can grow the best crops using lunar and Martian regolith simulant.

One of the groups of students, who call themselves the Green Team, earned Best in Show awards at the school level for their experiment to grow lettuce. The Green Team's hy-

pothesis tested how layering soil, compost, and regolith differently would affect the growth of lettuce.

"I am incredibly pleased for them," says Manchester School fifth-grade teacher Tracy Henderson. "It was a tremendous amount of work. But it's a really big deal that they won this."

Two classrooms at the school participated, with three teams in Henderson's classroom who participated in Plant the Moon Challenge where students used lunar regolith simulant to test plant growth, and another three teams in Cindy Moore's classroom who experimented for Plant Mars using Martial regolith simulant.

Henderson said the experiment gave students the opportunity to exhibit extraordinary leadership.

"That was really fun to watch over the course of a couple of months watching kids really become leaders," she said.

The Plant the Moon and Plant Mars Challenge is part of a new United States initiative to explore more of the lunar surface than ever before through NASAs Artemis Campaign. Its purpose is to explore the moon for scientific discovery, make technology advancements, and to learn how to live and work on another world as humans prepare for manned missions to Mars.

The other two teams in Henderson's class called themselves the Blue Team and Red Team. The Blue Team tested the differences in growth of radishes and spinach using a blue light or

regular grow light, and the Red Team tested how different amounts of soil, compost, and regolith would affect the growth of spinach.

In Moore's classroom for Plant Mars, teams included The Seven Seeds who grew radishes, Team Astreaus who grew lettuce and radishes, and Team Nyx who grew bok choy. Their independent variables were either the amount of water or type of fertilizer based on pH, and use of pink light.

"It involves a lot of work, for Mrs. Moore and myself because no one in Maine has ever done something like this before and we certainly have never done this kind of project before," says Henderson. "It involves teaching a lot of vocabulary like what is a variable and what does control mean in an experiment."

The classrooms of Henderson and Moore received a grant to complete their experiment from the Maine Space Grant Consortium (MSGC), a non-profit organization that is affiliated with NASA.

"There is a Space Grant in every state, including DC and Puerto Rico. We run, conduct, and fund NASA and other STEM programs in Maine," said Jana Hall of Maine Space Grant Consortium. "Plant the Moon/Mars is a NASA program and so far, that we are aware of, we haven't had any Maine schools participate yet until Manchester Elementary."

When students are involved in the NHS, volunteering gives them service hours which goes toward the required 24 hours each member needs per year. It is also just a great way for them to


get involved, and demonstrate their leadership skills, which had nominated them in the first place.



# New work overtime rule to go into effect July 1

The U.S. Department of Labor has announced that a final rule regarding overtime compensation will take effect on July 1, 2024. The final rule updates and revises the regulations issued under section 13(a)(1) of the Fair Labor Standards Act implementing the exemption from minimum wage and overtime pay requirements for executive, administrative, and professional (EAP) employees. Revisions include increases to the standard salary level and the highly compensated employee total annual compensation threshold, and a mechanism for the updating of these earnings thresholds to reflect current earnings data.

While this new rule will take effect in Maine, Maine law does not have an exemption from overtime for highly compensated employees.

### Background

Employees are exempt from the Fair Labor Standards Act's minimum wage and overtime protections if they are employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity, as those terms are defined in the Department's regulations at 29 CFR part 541. To fall within the EAP exemption, an employee generally must meet three tests:

- be paid a salary, meaning that they are paid a predetermined and fixed amount that is not subject to reduction because of variations in the quality or quantity of work performed;
- be paid at least a specified weekly salary level; and

• primarily perform executive, administrative, or professional duties, as provided in the department's regulations.

Those regulations also provide an alternative test for certain highly compensated employees who are paid a salary, earn above a higher total annual compensation level, and satisfy a minimal duties test.

The final rule will increase the standard salary level and the highly compensated employee total annual compensation threshold on the rule's effective date on July 1, 2024, and on Jan. 1, 2025, when changes in the methodologies used to calculate these levels become applicable. The final rule also provides for future updates of these levels every three years to reflect current earnings data.

### How will this affect Maine?

When there is both a federal and state wage and hour law, whichever law is most protective is the enforced law. In this case, this means that the new federal rule will be enforced in Maine by the Maine Department of Labor beginning on July 1, 2024, except for the exemption from overtime for highly compensated employees.

- The current minimum salary in Maine is \$816.35 per week.
- The new minimum salary as of July 1, 2024 will be \$844 per week.
- The new minimum salary as of January 1, 2025 will be \$1,128 per week.

ticipating in the challenge was brought to her by a mother of one of her previous students whose younger sibling is now in Moore's class. The student's mother, Nikki Becker, is a scientist and on the Board of Directors with the Maine Space Grant Consortium. She proposed the idea in Henderson's classroom while giving a presentation one day, and since then has helped the school get in contact with MSGC to receive the grant and sign up for the competition.

"We really owe it to her," says Henderson.

After signing up for the challenge, each team of students received a lunar or Martian soil simulant package complete with pots, masks, and a pH meter or strips and a digital Project Guide from the Institute of Competition Sciences. The lunar and Martian soil simulants are specially designed to mimic the soil of the Moon or Mars in chemistry, composition, grain size, and density. Following the Project Guide,

students create your own experiment to examine important variables related to plant growth in the simulant.

In their experiment to grow lettuce from lunar soil by layering the compost, soil and regolith, the Green Team faced student-scientist type challenges such as going on February vacation, which was solved by another teacher taking care of the plants while they were away. At one point, they faced "having no school, no power, and no water for our plants for about four days, but luckily they survived," as the team described their findings.

In their report, the Green Team wrote that they kept track of data by measuring the height of their lettuce plants every week, however the results showed "the (plants) that didn't grow had moss that absorbed most of the water and the ones that didn't grow that didn't have moss but had bad seeds." The team concluded by saying "we think that the layers did not work because the plant that grew the best did not have any layers. It was mixed together." <

# What is Tooth Resorption and How is it Treated?

If you have a pet, especially a cat, you may have heard the term tooth resorption during your pet's oral exam. So, what is tooth resorption? Tooth resorption is a condition in which the tooth or teeth are reabsorbed by the body. The cells that are responsible for breaking down the baby teeth called odontoclasts become reactivated and start breaking down the adult teeth. This process often starts at the root of the tooth and eventually makes its way to the surface. Most of the time, tooth resorption is not painful until it affects the crown of the tooth. When the crown is affected the nerves of the tooth become exposed and bacteria can enter the tooth and cause inflammation and infection. Sometimes periodontal disease and inflammation can lead to tooth resorption, but often we do not know what caused tooth resorption in our pets, especially when it comes to cats.

Cats are especially prone to tooth resorption. It is estimated that approximately one third of cats will develop tooth resorption in their lifetime and unfortunately, tooth resorption becomes more common as they age. There is no effective known treatment to reverse or deter further resorption, so these affected teeth must be extracted. Tooth resorption is the most common oral abnormality found in cats.

Dogs can also develop tooth resorption, though not as often as cats. It can often go undiagnosed if dental x-rays are not utilized, as it commonly affects a large part of the root of the tooth. Tooth resorption can also progress more slowly in dogs and it is possible for a tooth with root resorption to remain stable for years. Dogs that chew on hard objects such as antlers and marrow bones may have an increased risk of root resorption. Older dogs are more likely to have severe resorption of the crown, a very painful condition.

Clinically, severe tooth resorption can be easily seen on oral examination. Other times tooth resorption may present like a mild case of gingivitis. In cats, the most common teeth to be affected are the upper and lower third premolars. If gingivitis is seen on these teeth, tooth resorption should always be a differential and further investigation with dental x-rays and an oral exam under anesthesia are necessary.

Dental x-rays are critical when it comes to diagnosing and treating tooth resorption. Tooth resorption can present in different types or stages, each requiring a different type of treatment. If the roots of the affected tooth appear to be resorbing and those roots have been replaced with bone, then the resorbing roots do not need to be removed, and the oral surgeon can remove the crown and any part of the root that is still visible. Sometimes one root may be resorbing, and the other is still intact and other times it is determined that both roots need to be removed. Dental x-rays determine the type of resorption occurring, the appropriate technique for extraction, and confirm whether the tooth was properly removed via extraction.

Research is still being pursued on this disease, especially in cats, but as of right now we do not have a way to treat it once it starts. Good oral hygiene and regular dental cleaning and exams under anesthesia may help in some cases, but, for the most part, we do not know how to prevent it either. Once tooth resorption is diagnosed, especially on the crown, the tooth must be extracted because it will continue to progress and cause pain.

Clinical signs that you may notice in a pet with tooth resorption could be avoiding chewing on one side of the mouth, chewing with the head tilted, dropping food, avoiding hard food or treats, not playing with toys, eating less and eating slower. If you notice any of these signs in your pet or see inflammation, redness, or bleeding in their mouth, we highly recommend an oral exam with a veterinarian and scheduling dental x-rays and an oral exam under anesthesia. Since this condition is more commonly seen in older pets, bloodwork and other diagnostics may be necessary to ensure anesthesia safety, but, thankfully, age is not a disease, and most of these pets can undergo anesthesia safely, with the proper protocol.

If you have not talked to your veterinarian about your pet's oral health recently, we highly recommend it. Tooth resorption can have a huge impact on their quality of life and dental disease can even shorten their lifespan due to infection and inflammation in the body. 

Many famous people were born on the same day of the same year. # Grave of Civil War Medal of Honor recipient Daniel Scammon can be found in Raymond cemetery

Civil War hero Daniel Scammon Milliken is one of the least-recognized residents of Raymond, but his heroism endures to this very day.

Milliken was awarded the Medal of Honor on Aug. 30, 1870 to recognize his meritorious conduct during the U.S. Navy attacks on Fort Fisher, North Carolina in the Civil War. He served as Quarterdeck gunner onboard the USS New Ironsides.

He received the Medal of Honor for his leadership and heroism specifically in the Jan. 15, 1865 Second Battle of Fort Fisher where he manned a cannon that laid fire to the fort. Unfortunately, for more than 100 years Milliken's accomplishments remained wholly unrecognized, and a simple marble stone was placed on his gravesite following his death, notating only his birth and death date.

Milliken was born in Saco in 1838 and joined the U.S. Navy in New York City. Following his Civil War military service, Milliken married a Raymond resident, moved to the town, and went on to establish a local farm. He died in Raymond on May 3, 1899, at the age of 58.

The Congressional Medal of Honor Society website honors Milliken's heroism in an excerpt from its "Stories of Sacrifice" section.

"The ship steamed in and took the lead in the ironclad division close inshore and immediately opened its starboard battery in a barrage of well-directed fire to cause several fires and explosions and dismount several guns during the first two days of fighting. Taken under fire as she

steamed into position on 13 January, the New Ironsides fought all day and took on ammunition at night despite severe weather conditions. When the enemy came out of his bombproofs to defend the fort against the storming party, the ship's battery disabled nearly every gun on the fort facing the shore before the cease-fire orders were given by the flagship."

Fortunately for residents and visitors to the Lakes Region, the national Medal of Honor organization contacted the American Legion Field Allen Post 148 in Windham to ask for assistance in honoring Milliken with an appropriate monument. Momentum built as Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 10643, the Raymond Casco Historical Society, the Windham Historical Society, and the Town of Raymond all joined forces to raise funds to honor the distinguished veteran.

On July 4, 2015, local dignitaries joined with town officials and Third Maine, a Civil War reenactment group, in presenting a Medal of Honor Memorial Service in Raymond honoring Milliken and issued a proclamation recognizing his extraordinary contributions during the Civil War. Members from the American Legion Field Allen Post joined with the Town of Raymond to unveil a new gravestone for Milliken to commemorate his achievements.

Milliken's grave can be found at the Riverside Cemetery, located at 168 Plains Road (off Route 85) in Raymond. His plot is in Section C, Row K, Lot 10 in the cemetery. Visitors are welcomed and reminded to observe all cemetery ordinances set forth by the town. <

According to Kimball, they need to work on being aware of every pitcher's movement so they can adjust sooner in the game and make sure they're smooth on defense.



MPM Sealcoating fourth grader Tanner Pulkkinen walked.


In the second inning, fifth grader Kainen Pouliot walked and later scored after third grader Grady Inzerillo advanced to second base after being hit by a pitch.

Buyer Z was looking for a new house with me. She did all the preplanning we discussed with getting financials in order, all pre-approved, and was ready to go if we found the right property. In my daily search that I do, I also check the "coming soon" market to see what is

about to hit the market. That's where I found the right house and it was going to hit the market the next day. I scheduled the first appointment the next day for us to view it.

She loved it but I warned her there were eight other showings scheduled over the next two days. We went back to the office and wrote a very strong offer, slightly over the list price with a short window for the seller to respond within about eight hours. We successfully blocked out all the buyers

in the other showings and went under contract that evening.

These are just a couple of examples of recent transactions that have taken place. Hopefully they will help you think about how important it is to find the right broker for yourself. Interview or at least talk to a couple of real estate brokers about what their own strengths are in real estate.

Hopefully they can easily provide you with some recent examples or even provide a few previous clients you can talk to. And if you do have a friend who has a real estate license, you should not be concerned about not using them. We are professionals and should never get upset about our friends choosing to work with someone else. It is part of the business and nothing to take personal. If they do get upset with you that is not your fault and maybe it's a good thing you don't use someone who isn't professional.



She's looking for a friend and goes upstairs but is told there is no one there. However, soon Bea realizes she and Cal (who lives upstairs) can see everyone's forgotten IFs or Imaginary Friends. There are so many



of them, once a child outgrows their Imaginary Friend, they need to be rematched with another kid. It's up to Bea and Cal to see if they can connect kids, current and former, with their Imaginary Friends.

This was a very sweet and sincere movie that makes you feel many emotions but is ultimately fun, too.

"IF" has a star-studded cast of Cailey Fleming, Ryan Reynolds, John Krasinski, Fiona Shaw, Steve Carell, Phoebe Waller-Bridge, Louis Gossett Jr., Alan Kim, Bobby Moynihan, Awkwafina, Emily Blunt, George Clooney, Bradley Cooper, Matt Damon, Bill Hader, Richard Jenkins, Keegan-Michael Key, Blake Lively, Sebastian Maniscalco and Brad Pitt.

Bea (Fleming) is moving in with her grandmother (Shaw) after losing her mother and her father (Krasinski) is in the hospital for heart surgery. Bea is feeling sad and alone.

One night, she notices someone that looks to be about her height, but they hurry upstairs before she gets a chance to see them. Bea meets Cal (Reynolds) who lives upstairs.

She spies on him breaking into a home one night. After addressing Cal about this Bea learns he's there for Blue (Carell) a giant fuzzy - and purple - IF, or Imaginary Friend. For whatever reason, Cal, an adult, is able to see all the forgotten Imaginary Friends that children leave behind; Bea can also see them and meets Blossom (Waller-Bridge) who lives with Cal and Blue.

Cal explains that the right IF needs to matched up to the right child. Only children who need IFs can see them.

Cal takes Bea to an amusement park where they meet more IFs.

"They're not scary, they're worse – desperate," says Cal.

At a retirement home for IFs, Bea meets Louis (Gossett Jr.), a bear, who wants her help with placement. He tells her the retirement community can be anything she wants; it just takes a little imagination. Bea decides to take on the task of matching IFs to the right children.

Cal and Bea interview IFs for Benjamin (Kim), a child patient, at the hospital where Bea's dad is. However, Benjamin cannot see the IFs.

"Will you please put some pants on, you're freaking everybody out," Cal says to Banana (Hader). This was one of my favorite lines.

Bea helps Blue find his child (now an adult), but it doesn't go well. On their second attempt, the result is different.

Bea learns some touching lessons throughout the movie.

Written and directed by John Krasinski, who was inspired by his own children as he watched them use their imaginations, "IF" hits all the points of being a near-perfect family movie that works on multiple levels to entertain, touch, inspire and open the imagination of both children and adults. It deals with some pretty tough subject matter, the loss of a parent at a young age, but


