Spirituality remains prominent element in Boston Post Cane recipient's life

Pearl Grant believes that every life has a spiritual purpose, and that every person plays a role in the spiritual development of others. It's a philosophy that has guided Pearl throughout her life and now as the oldest resident of the town after she was presented with the Boston Post Cane by the Town of Windham.

Grant will turn 100 on June 2 and remains an active churchgoer and hosts a bible study group at her home every week. She graduated from Windham High School in 1943 and says that her family and God are key elements of her life as she's about to reach the centenarian milestone that only 0.027 percent of Americans live to.

"Now that I've lived this long, I honestly can't see a big difference from being 99 and being 100," Grant said. "It's about the same to me. God has certainly blessed me to live this long."

Windham Town Clerk Linda Morrell visited Grant at her home on Tuesday morning and presented her with a replica of the town's Boston Post Cane before a gathering of friends and family.

Morrell read a citation recognizing Grant's longevity and Pearl recalled

that she was present when Morrell gave the cane to her mother Ethel in 2001. Ethel Verrill had the cane as Windham's oldest resident until she passed away in 2007.

The history of the Boston Post Cane is a story that has long outlived its creator, Morrell said.

"On Aug. 2, 1909, Edwin A. Grozier, the publisher of the Boston Post newspaper, forwarded to the Board of Selectmen in 700 towns in New England an ebony cane with a gold-head with the request that it be presented with the compliments of the Boston Post to the town."

Launching the Boston promote his newspaper,

Grozier mandated that no cities were to be involved, only towns, and that the recipient of the cane was to use it as long as he lived or moved away. Upon the death of the town's cane recipient, Grozier said that the honor should be handed down to the next

> oldest citizen of the town. That way, the cane would come to be a symbolic representation of the town and not the individual who received it.

> The original Boston Post Canes were manufactured by J.F. Fradley and Company of New York and de

rived from ebony that was shipped in 7-foot lengths from the Congo in Africa. The ebony was cut into suitable cane lengths, seasoned for six months, and then turned on lathes to just the right thickness, and then coated and polished.

Each original cane had a 14-carat gold head some 2 inches long and decorated by hand with a ferruled tip. The cane's head was engraved with the inscription — Presented by the Boston Post to the oldest citizen of (name of town) — "To Be Transmitted."

At its inception, 700 towns received the canes. By 2020, more than 510 towns were still participating. In 1930, the Boston Post Cane tradition was modified to include women recipients and in 1956, the newspaper stopped publica-

tion, but its legacy and tradition endures to this very day.

Windham's first Boston Post Cane recipient was Elijah Cook in 1909, and now that distinction belongs to Grant, who succeeds the late Hazel see POST CANE Page 9

Polar Plunge or Spring Soak? Chamber event boosts 'Feed the Need' for 11 local food pantries

On Saturday, April 19, roughly 30 community members and their sponsors gathered at the sunny lakefront on Saint Joseph's College campus in Standish to raise money for hungry

Amber Rankine, the Sebago Lakes Region Chamber of Commerce's President and CEO, sounded the countdown at 11:55 a.m. by exclaiming "Five minutes to the plunge."

The Sebago Lakes Region Chamber of Commerce may have billed this event as a "Polar Plunge" but Saturday's noon temperature - almost 70 degrees - had several participants joking about a rebranding as they cast anticipatory glances at the yet undisturbed waters of Sebago Lake.

Rankine explained that 100 percent of the proceeds from the day's event would be donated to the Feed the Need charitable trust.

"Feed the Need is our ending hunger campaign, and we give funds to all 11 food pantries that are in the Sebago Lakes Chamber region. And it's not just food. Some people need things like toiletries or diapers or formula," she said. "The funds go directly to the pantries. We don't purchase anything for them. We just let them

do what they need to as far as taking care of their community goes."

She hoped to collect about \$1,000 from the event but said that any amount raised was sure to help, especially given the current economy and recent federal cuts. Research done by the national nonprofit organization Feeding America shows that food insecurity affects one in eight Mainers. Inclusive in that number are roughly 45,000 children.

The concept of the Polar Plunge was simple: participants registered for the plunge, raised money through sponsorships, and committed to jumping in the lake at midday. Some folks arrived costumed, most notably, the mother-son team of Lisa and Sean Deane of Windham, who showed up dressed as Disney's Ursula, and rock legend Elvis. To help participants warm themselves, local business Too Haute Saunas provided portable saunas which had frequent use throughout the day as plungers emerged an egg hunt were also part of the

Despite the amenities and the warm weather, participants understood the spring thaw has not yet warmed the depths of Sebago Lake.

John Daniels and his 13-year-old son Isaiah have participated in several past plunges hosted by various organizations, however, both voiced good-natured trepidation as the noon hour approached, and estimated the water temperature to be around 33 degrees. Despite reservations, the duo

eventually took the plunge without hesitation.

"This is a good cause, and we want to help out," said Daniels, who works at Edward Jones in Windham and solicited sponsorship from his colleagues, some in attendance.

Misty Coolidge of the Coolidge Family Farm in New Gloucester detailed her motivation for attending the event as she watched her three children, Caden, Eva, and Grace, gleefully make the jump.

"I am Mrs. New England and my platform for over 20 years has been fighting hunger," Coolidge said. "As a member of the Chamber, I love that they have the Feed the Need cause. I try to go to all their events because this need is so important."

She drew attention to the success of the Feed the Need program outside of this singular event. Just this last year, the Chamber donated \$20,000 to food pantry directors in need of as-

"I wish there were hundreds of people here," Coolidge said.

The simplest thing not everyone has

When I was growing up, I used to receive compliments for my manners but to be honest, the credit belongs to my parents who drilled into me the basics of etiquette. My father would describe etiquette to my younger brother and me as like traffic lights for our interactions with others and he said that courtesy was simply a way to show respect for others. My mother was a stickler for proper manners and believed that displays of improper etiquette required immediate corrections.

She was "hands-on" with her corrections of bad manners and many times the lobe of my right ear was yanked as she made a point. Her understanding of good manners also made her mandate that children should not place their elbows on the table when seated for dinner.

According to my parents, exhibiting proper manners included always being mindful of other people's feelings, beliefs, and expectations and helped to create more positive relationships with everyone in our lives. That included teachers, grocery clerks, bus drivers, aunts and uncles, the mailman and the doctor.

I thought of this last Saturday night while I was sitting alone at a table at a Rock n' Roll dance waiting for my wife to return from the restroom. I was scrolling through my iPhone looking at Major League Baseball scores. When she arrived back at the table, she immediately informed me that looking at my phone was bad manners and anti-social.

Here are some of my parents' basic manners tenets:

Wait to eat until everyone is seated and served. During my U.S. Air Force Basic Training experience, if I was to arrive at a vacant table for four in the dining hall, I was required to stand at attention with my hand raised indicating how many seats were left at the table. Once all the seats were filled, you could sit down and eat your meal. To this day no matter if I'm sitting in a restaurant or at home, if I'm served first, I won't start eating until everyone's food is at the table.

Respect the personal space of others. My father stressed that I never stand too close to people and insisted that I always ask before touching someone. That included always asking before reaching into someone else's refrigerator or cupboards when visiting friends or neighbors. Years ago, I had a boss at the newspaper I was working at who would come up from behind me when I was sitting at my cubicle and working on my computer. He wanted to see what I was typing and would creep up so close to me to catch a glimpse of my computer screen that I could feel his hot breath on the back of my neck. It was a disregard for my personal space and the other reporters in our department to whom he did the same thing.

Being punctual means you're never late. My mother explained to me that it shows respect for other people's time when you are on time or early for appointments and meetings. To this very day, I try to arrive for my appointments in advance of the scheduled time not only for my own peace of mind, but also to let the person I have the appointment with know I'm there. Once I was attending a press briefing for an author who had written a popular book and the author had noticed I had arrived early and was so impressed by that, he offered me an exclusive interview after the other reporters had left.

Always tip service workers well. My father came from a family of nine kids during the Great Depression. He worked for 19 cents an hour every day after high school classes at a company that made tin cans. He understood that no matter what a person's job or social status was, they deserved to be singled out for the exceptional service that they provide. He went out his way to thank waitresses, janitors, or garbage men with a generous tip as appreciation. My father said that leaving a tip is a polite way of saying thank you while recognizing and acknowledging the value of contributions that service workers make to our lives.

Offering to help others is a sign of courtesy. Whether it was helping an elderly woman carry a bag of groceries to her car or returning shopping carts to the proper collection area, my mother demanded that I do something useful for others when I was out in public with her. She told me when I was a paperboy that I should always bring newspapers I was delivering to a subscriber's front steps, rather than pitching them in their driveway as I rode past their homes on my bicycle. She would often send me over to a neighbor's house to help rake

> leaves for them or shovel snow from their sidewalk. Years later, I still push the shopping carts back neatly in the collection spot instead of just leaving it for someone else to push there.

The way I see it, good manners are a way of showing other people that we respect them. Sadly, it seems to be disappearing in today's world. <





Sewer line installation underway in North Windham

A significant step to improving public health and sustainable economic development has started in North Windham, as a contractor has begun to install sewer lines there.

Windham Communications Director Roger Cropley said the project is a collaboration between the Town of Windham and the Portland Water District with sewer line installation work starting in the Shaw's parking lot area of North Windham.

Cropley said the sewer line will span the Shaw's parking lot through the Walmart lot, and over to Landing Road before crossing Route 302 to the Windham Mall. Shaw Brothers Construction also started installing another section of the sewer line April 20 along Route 115 in North Windham, he said.

"The installation will begin on the Gray side of Walgreens, progressing across Boody's Corner and over to a section of Route 35, eventually connecting to the line being installed through the Shaw's parking lot," Cropley said. "That work will run through early May."

According to Cropley, the sewer line work is scheduled to be performed at night in order to cause as little disruption for motorists as possible.

"Construction will start at 6 p.m. and go to 6 a.m. with start times varying depending on traffic volume," he said. "Flaggers and police will be set up each night to control and redirect traffic when lane closures are in effect. The sewer work is scheduled to be completed by June."

Voters approved installation of a sewer system in Windham during a special referendum in June 2022.

By installing a sewer system treating 50,000 gallons per day, Windham Town Manager Barry Tibbetts said that business growth in North Windham will be of significant benefit to the community, leading to economic growth and the creation of new housing, new hotels, new office and retail space and affordable options for small-scale manufacturing development.

Tibbetts said that environmental benefits will also be realized by installing sewers in North Windham including preventing 7,500 pounds per year of nitrogen and 1,000 pounds of phosphorous from entering the aquifer.

"This project will be the first of this magnitude in Maine and can be a model for other communities who lack receiving waters," he said. "It will be the most advanced micro-filtration system in the state for handling contaminants."

Along with the sewers, construction of a public wastewater system will result in the removal of about 100 septic systems that are currently discharging into the North Windham aquifer, Tibbetts said. A collection and pumping system over three miles in length will connect businesses and

residents to the system and will treat wastewater through the advanced micro-filtration system.

"Current businesses will be able to further grow and expand while new businesses can be situated without further degrading the aquifer and using valuable real estate for septic systems." Tibbetts said.

The overall estimated cost of the sewer project is \$40.4 million. Partnering with the Portland Water District and RSU 14 to create the massive infrastructure project, the Windham Town Council covered the initiative through a combination of grant funding, a \$38.9 million award by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, and North Windham TIF funding supported by North Windham businesses.

Because of construction costs and materials increases since receiving voter approval in 2022, Tibbetts said that a warrant article approved by voters at the 2024 Windham Annual Town Meeting authorized the town to issue a bond of \$4 million through the state's Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund. In doing that, the sewer project shortfall will have no impact for taxpayers.

The new system includes the creation of a new pumping station near Windham High School and RSU 14 that would service from the high school campus to a new treatment facility in North Windham and establish a wastewater treatment facility on the grounds of Manchester School and a new pumping station at Windham Middle School. <

Windham Middle School special education teacher forges lasting relationships with students

Special education teachers are uniquely trained to support the learning needs of students with disabilities and to ensure their educational, behavioral, social, and emotional success. Windham Middle School has one of the best in Adam Deveau.

Deveau is now in his eighth year working at WMS and says he considers himself fortunate to be part of the RSU 14 team. In his job, Deveau is challenged to find specific interventions that fulfill the needs of his students, kind of like trying to solve a new puzzle every day.

"My responsibilities vary a bit from year to year. This year, my main responsibilities include providing specialized instruction and supporting students throughout the day when they are challenged or struggling," Deveau said." Since starting at WMS, I have taught reading, writing, math, and science on the academic side as well as social skills, social-emotional learning, and executive functioning. I also create and manage educational plans and positive behavior support plans."

At the middle school, special education teachers work with fewer students than their general education counterparts and they also work with the same group of students over the course of several years they attend classes there. The smaller class sizes in special education coupled with the increased time of working with the same students at WMS gives him the opportunity to forge strong relationships with his students and their families.

"The best thing about what I do in my job is that I am in a unique position to help improve the their overall experi-

ence at Windham Middle School and when I do my job well, I see amazingly positive outcomes in the way they feel about school in general."

But the most challenging aspect of Deveau's job is the fact that he can only be in one place at a time and sometimes there are many things that he would like to be doing and many people he would like to be supporting.

"People don't always understand that special education is not just a service to address academic needs,

but it also can help students that struggle in many areas including behavior, daily living skills, and social skills," he said.

Born in Dayton, Ohio, Deveau's family moved to Maine when he was just an infant. He has spent much of his life living in Bridgton and graduated Lake Region High School. He origi-Maine but when I graduated, he found out that "philosopher" is not exactly

a job in high demand. He enrolled at USM again and earned enough additional credits to become a special education teacher.

According to Deveau, he first applied to work at WMS when the school that he was working for moved to a new location further away.

"I have taught nearly every subject in special education. I started my career in a private day treatment program for students with emotional and behavioral health challenges," Deveau

said. "After that I came to WMS, and have worked as a functional academic teacher, a resource room teacher, and a behavior support teacher."


He says he's enjoyed many memorable moments working for WMS.

"Some of my favorite memories include seeing them perform in talent shows, participate in door decorating contests, and other moments where they chose to step up to the plate to show us their unique skills and talents," Deveau said. "The moment that stands out the most is when I worked with a group of students who came into my room almost every day to learn how to sing three or four songs. Our goal was to bring some joy and entertainment to the residents of Ledgewood Manor, a local assisted living facility. On the day they performed, my students showed courage, compassion and kindness in so many ways, and I was honored to help them."

Humorist preparing for Raymond Village Library concert

This Saturday, there will be no "shushing" in the Raymond Village Library, only strumming, singing, and laughter. Musician and humorist Red Gallagher will be performing a public concert at the Village Library in Raymond at noon on Saturday, April 26.

Red Gallagher puts on an up-beat performance that blends music and humor. As a one-man-band he plays guitar, harmonica, piano and sings. He's created parodies from top artists such as Steve Goodman, John Prime and the Beatles. Overall, his songs include blues, jazz, country, folk, rock and roll and many classic pop tunes.

The show also welcomes a special guest, Lorraine Gallagher, Red Gallagher's talented wife with beautiful vocals. Together, the two form The Redbird Duo. Lorraine Gallagher is a New England woman who sings and plays guitar. Her song selections include classics from Joni Mitchell, Carol King, Eva Cassidy, and other great female artists.

Gallagher has been a full-time professional musician for 49 years. He has made three vinyl records and two solo compact disc albums and one compact disc album for The Redbird Duo. Additionally, he has toured with renowned artists such as B.B. King, B.J. Thomas, The Oak Ridge Boys, and rock band Three Dog Night.

"Highest thrills of my career were opening concerts for B.B. King," said Gallagher, "He was very nice to me, and it's all been downhill since then," he joked, "and also he gave me some good advice, but I stayed in music anyway."

When ask if he is retired, Gallagher answered, "I'm not retired by any

means. I'm still working full time, but I have retired from the nightclub scene."

In other words, he doesn't party like he used to, but the party is still happening.

"I've done a lot of things in my career, you know, college circuit, cruise ships, big name concert openers but, at this point, I'm mainly doing community shows for seniors and social groups and festivals," Gallagher said.

Next week, Gallagher has six concerts booked all at various retirement communities, and another six more the following week. Since straying away from the late-night music scene, Gallagher has found himself enjoying sharing his time, music and jokes with folks similar to his own age, who can share the nostalgia in his performance.

"It's really rewarding," says Gal-

lagher, "They love it, and I get a lot of real positive feedback from them. Also, they think I'm young," he laughs, "but really they're my age, in their 70s and such, so, like me they grew up with The Beatles and Bob Dylan. I know a lot of music that they enjoy and remember."

Gallagher is now 75 years old and is originally from the Midwest and lived most of his adult life in Minneapolis-St. Paul. He uses many aspects of his life to create comical parodies. From the state of Minnesota he created Minnesota Winter which has been upgraded in the past 20 years to New England Winter. Yes, it's a song about how cold and grumpy we all get in

winter, but we love it, we really do.

The musician has always included humor in his performances. Why?

"Because I like to laugh, and I like to make people laugh," he said.

Gallagher moved to New Hampshire roughly 20 years ago and stayed for 10 years, before moving to Maine where he has resided since.


Lorraine and Red Gallagher married 19 years ago. They dated for two years, and he never knew she was musical. Once it was discovered, they started singing and playing together and have since created The Redbird Duo. The Redbird Duo will be performing at the Fryeburg fair twice this year, and also at the Steep Falls Gazebo in Standish on July 30.

His career started when as a young, 25-year-old with clearly enough confidence, he strolled into a booking agency, sang some songs and made them laugh, and the rest is history. Gallagher's family wasn't full of musicians and performers, in fact the only family member that played an instrument was his aunt, who played the piano. She taught him piano and became a huge supporter as he made his way onto the stage as a young boy. In high school, Gallagher taught himself guitar to play some of his favorite tunes.

Windham Historical Society to host Victorian Tea Party

The Little Meeting House in North Windham will be decorated in a Victorian style setting for a special High Tea at High Noon on Saturday, May 31. This event is being held in honor of the passing of the Windham Historical Society's Secretary Karen Lougee in January.

Haley Pal is one of three Event Coordinators for High Tea at High Noon with the other coordinators being Susan Simonson, the Society's President and Carol Manchester, the Membership Chair.

"This is the first time we are doing a tea," says Pal. "It was inspired by the passing of our Secretary Karen Lougee in January. Lougee loved all things British, was an avid reader and Steward of the Windham Center Library on the Society's Village Green. Her favorite flowers were lilacs, so we decided to host an event in her memory during lilac season."

Lougee's love of books and his-

tory came together when she joined the Windham Historical Society after retiring from Unum. She joined the Society's Board and served as Secretary and on the Programs Committee. Lougee enthusiastically helped and led in the restoration of the original Windham Center Library building for the Society's Village Green, proudly completing this large and complex project in the fall of 2024.

She also worked hard to restore the library and has left this piece of Windham history as her lasting gift to the community.

"Lougee's first exposure to Windham Historical Society was at a fundraiser held in 2017," says Susan Simonson, President of the Windham Historical Society. "As a way to encourage more membership and exposure of the society, we held a History Tour around Windham, highlighting the historical sites and building while providing local Windham history. Lougee and her husband, Gerry, were on that tour. It was not long afterward

Lougee showed interest in becoming an active member of the society. She ran and was elected Secretary the following year. It did not take long for her to blend into the fabric of the historical society, helping in any way she could. Lougee was retired from Unum's legal department, and her administrative and professional skills were much welcomed by the organization. She was able to juggle many hats, and most importantly her love for her family."

High Tea at High Noon will start at noon on May 31 and run about two hours long. It will open with a greeting from Simonson. Then, a buffet luncheon will be served with the meal consisting of quiche, tea sandwiches, hot and cold hors d'oeuvres, mini muffins, scones, and a large assortment of delicate desserts.

"During lunch, Ray Marcotte and Elle Kanner of Teafarers will do a talk about the history of tea and talk about some of the teas that guests will be sampling with their lunch," says Pal. "Dessert will be served by Society members and be delivered to each table. Desserts range from cupcakes to mini cheesecakes, to tea breads to cream puffs,

The building had a major structural issue and took a year or two to get it addressed. Once those repairs were completed, the roof was re-shingled, windows were puttied, the exterior painted. Raymond Fire urges caution amid heightened fire danger

As Maine enters the spring fire season, the Raymond Fire & Rescue Department is urging residents to exercise heightened caution with outdoor burning and fire-related activities.

Spring conditions and rising temperatures have increased the risk of wildfires across the state.

Burning Laws & Permit Requirements

In Maine, a valid open burning permit is required for most outdoor fires, including brush piles, debris burning, and campfires and now fireworks. Permits can be obtained through the Maine Forest Service's online system or by contacting the Raymond Fire Department. Burning is only permitted on days when the fire danger is low to moderate (Class 1 or 2) depending on the wind. Burning on high-risk days (Class 3 or above) is prohibited. Violations may result in fines or legal action. Although a permit is issued, you are still responsible if the fire gets out of hand. If unpredicted winds kick up, extinguish the

Understanding Fire Danger Class Days

The Maine Forest Service assigns daily Fire Danger Class ratings (1 to 5) based on:

- Temperature
- Humidity
- Wind speed
- Recent precipitation
- Fuel moisture content

These ratings are crucial for determining safe burning conditions. Residents can check the daily Fire Danger Class at Maine Forest Service's website. When there is little to no new, green vegetation popping up, wildfire conditions change quickly with just a little bit of wind. The wind can carry flames to last year's fallen leaves, downed branches, and twigs. Fire spreads rapidly.

"As we enter a period and season of increased wildfire risk, it's vital for everyone to stay informed and take proactive measures," said Chief Bruce Tupper, Raymond Fire & Rescue. "Together, we can protect our homes and natural resources."

Wildfire Prevention Tips to protect your property

- Create a defensible space: Clear leaves, brush, and flammable materials at least 30 feet from structures.
- Use fire-resistant landscaping: Choose plants and materials that reduce fire risk.
- Maintain equipment: Ensure

grills, fire pits, and chimneys are clean and functioning properly.

- Never leave fires unattended: Always extinguish fires completely before leaving. There must be two adults present at the time of burning. Fire spreads faster than one person can extinguish.
- Be sure to have hand tools (rakes & shovels) and water nearby to extinguish your fire.

"We have been seeing wildland fires catching in places the last six months that typically do not have large wildland fires to battle. We want citizens and visitors to be safe with fire to help avoid a catastrophic event here in Maine," said Raymond Fire & Rescue Public Information Officer Scott Doyle.





Maine's new Public Advocate addresses inaccurate billing issues with community solar companies

Maine's Public Advocate Heather Sanborn has contacted community solar companies operating in Maine after receiving complaints from community solar customers who are enrolled in alternative delivery rates offered by CMP and Versant.

"These customers did not receive the advertised savings promised by the community solar providers," said Sanborn. "In

some instances, customers ended up paying more than they would have without a community solar subscrip-

The most common alternative rates include CMP's electric technology rate and seasonal heat pump rate.

In a memo to community solar providers, Sanborn notified the companies immediately to:

- Review all customer records to verify the chosen delivery rates,
- Ensure that billing for solar credits is based on the accurate, customer-selected rates,
- Correct any discrepancies in past billing and issue refunds or bill credits for any overcharges.

Sanborn notified the solar companies that failure to address and rectify this issue could result in the Office of the Public Advocate taking further action, including filing a request for investigation with the Maine Public Utilities Commission.



Sanborn is also urging consumers to review their utility bills carefully.

"Consumers should be aware of the delivery rates they signed up for and, if they are contracting with a community solar company, they need to review their bills and be sure they are receiving the savings they signed up for," she said. "If they are being billed at a higher rate, they should contact their solar company to request a refund."

Maine consumers can also contact the Office of the Public Advocate directly at 207-624-3687 for help with understanding their bills.

"Our goal is to safeguard the interests of Maine residents and ensure fair billing practices," said Sanborn.

She assumed her role as Maine Public Advocate earlier this year and said that more than 100,000 Maine households are paying pay some of the most expensive electricity bills currently in the United States and those bills are expected to remains steep this year. <

Gilman as the cane recipient. Gilman died last October at the age of 106.

The original Boston Post Cane for Windham is displayed at the Windham Town Hall. Morrell said a replica cane to be passed from recipient to recipient was created in 1999.

"Lloyd Murphy designed and created the showcase to display the original cane at no cost and Bruce Pulkkinen of Windham Millworks donated the wood," Morrell said. "Ed Kimball of Classic Impressions in Portland was the artisan of engraving the replica cane, brass plates for all past recipients and history of the cane. Frank Sennett of General Machine was the artisan of the brass head and stainless tip of the replica cane, and he spiffed up the original as well. The ends were looking beat up."

Families sign a document agreeing to return the replica cane when the time comes, Morrell said.

Grant was born on June 2, 1925 to Fred and Ethel Verrill in Windham and grew up on the family farm on Highland Cliff Road. After graduating from high school, Pearl found a job working for Blue Cross on Exchange Street in Portland.

In March 1947, she married Stanley Grant, and the couple were the parents of three children. Stanley died in 2014.

Of all the inventions that Grant has witnessed in her lifetime, she cites television as the one she thinks has had the most impact upon her life.

"I gave up driving at 96, so watching TV fills the time and gives me something to do," she said. <

Barbara Bagshaw: Protecting Maine's voice in Presidential Elections

Last Legislature passed a law that limits the voices of small states like Maine in selecting a President.

The National Popular Vote In-- Rep. Barbara Bagshaw terstate Compact

that was approved by lawmakers by one vote, and allowed to become law without the governor's signature,

would award the state's four electoral votes to whichever candidate garners the most popular votes nationwide, irrespective of who the majority of Mainers voted for at the ballot box.

The Electoral College is a constitutional provision that ensures that small states, like Maine, have a voice in selecting the President of the United States. Because of that provision, Maine has received attention from presidential candidates. The law attempts to circumvent the Constitution by surrendering Maine's voice through an interstate compact.

It means that if Mainers vote for a different candidate than the candidate winning the national popular vote, state electors would be bound to vote for the popular vote winner. The votes of large states with major cities like California and New York would dominate at

the expense of smaller, rural states.

The compact requires enough states to join before it is triggered. It has the potential to create national chaos in our court system, especially if there is a recount in any of the states.

I can only speculate why Governor Mills did not sign it. In her message she claimed that she had conflicted feelings about the law and saw merit in both sides. I personally believe that it is unconstitutional under Article 1, Sec. 10, Clause 3 because it enters into a state compact without Congressional approval. It will not withstand Supreme Court scrutiny if it is ever triggered.

Ironically, the law was passed to prevent President Trump from being elected because Democrats assumed he would lose the popular vote. In 2024, Trump won the popular vote and an Electoral College landslide, winning all the battleground states. It is dangerous to change the constitu-

tion for future electoral advantage by looking back at previous elections.

As your legislator I sponsored a bill to repeal the law and recently it had a public hearing. I am hopeful that there is enough bipartisan support to correct the mistake that was made and preserve Maine influence in Presidential elections. The legislature must carefully consider protecting Maine's 4 electoral votes from theft by large, urban states.

Rewilding saves money and time while also increasing biodiversity

As we look forward to the long days of summer, you might be thinking that your backyard needs restoration. But what if you don't have the time or funds to address it? Or perhaps you're interested in rewilding - a hands-off approach to increase biodiversity that creates habitat for native species like plants, pollinators, and birds.

Well, the good news is, you can do less work in your yard while doing more for the entire ecology of it.

"A pollinator garden is a bird garden is a biodiversity garden," says Deborah Perkins, the owner of First Light Wildlife Habitats.

Perkins has provided recommendations, plans, and designs for over 14,000 acres of habitat since 2010. She is known as "The Personal Ecologist" because she works closely with her clients to co-create biodiversity, beauty, and thriving habitats - from gardens to forestlands.

Plants and insects are the foundation of an ecosystem. Many insects, plants, and wildlife species have been in the same place at the same time for so long that they co-evolved.

Monarch butterflies cannot reproduce without their host plant milkweed because the caterpillars evolve to consume their foliage and now rely on it to complete their life cycle.

Building healthy food webs starts with native plants. Native plants feed insects and then insects feed birds and other wildlife. Insects also need leaf litter, native perennials and shrubs for food and shelter.

Unfortunately, the typical yard is turfgrass.

"It's just habitat for people" says

Thousands of blades of one species of grass where there could be many species is a serious example of lack of biodiversity.

In fact, one of the first steps for turning your 'ego-system' into an ecosystem is to reduce your lawn.

"See what grows," says Perkins. You might just find that a highbush blueberry was waiting to show itself.

Step two is to identify and replace invasive species with native plants. Invasive species reduce biodiversity because they out-compete with the native ones. Those co-evolved native

insects will not be able to use them as food or shelter.

Burning bush foliage turns a bright pinkish red which is strikingly beautiful. Once popular horticultural shrub, it is now illegal to sell. It is invasive and outcompetes the native species. Native wildlife does not derive the appropriate nutrition needed from its berries.

Replace your burning bushes with something equally as beautiful yet much more beneficial for birds and insects. Native Red chokeberry is a great substitute with its bright fall fo-

"It will also be part of the food web," says Perkins.

Another efficient way to grow biodiversity in your backyard is to stop using chemicals and pesticides.

While mosquitos and ticks are a nuisance to humans, the chemicals that remove them from our yards are detrimental to many other insects

"Getting rid of mosquitos and ticks require substances and most of those are broad spectrum," says Perkins. "They are not killing just mosquitoes and ticks, but everything else, too."



Lastly, Perkins suggests planting a native tree. You don't have to buy a tree. You can simply let an acorn germinate in your lawn or yard.

Trees capture carbon, reducing CO2 in the atmosphere but also provide shelter for wildlife. Tree roots store water to reduce runoff and erosion. The benefits are endless.

"It does not have to be expensive," says Perkins.

Increasing biodiversity can reduce your landscaping budget. Save by cutting back on gas for the grass cutter, line for your weed whacker, or chemicals for insect treatment.

You're also saving time by allowing nature to rewild your yard. The major theme of rewilding is doing less and letting nature regenerate.

"Having a lighter touch ... leaving trees to die and fall," says Perkins.

Woodpeckers nest in standing dead trees and mammals live in fallen logs. Insects nourish themselves in the detritus allowing for balanced soil through the nitrogen cycle.

"We are part of nature. We've been removed from it for a long time, but we are part of nature," says Perkins. "Our conventional cookie-cutter lawns are based on a very old standard that goes back to Victorian times when only the rich had lawns and opens spaces. Today we can use our open spaces for good."

Of course, we might still care about public image and opinion. If you're looking to rewild your property but don't want others to think you're cutting back on expenses or be viewed as a lazy landowner, there are ways to

make rewilding look intentional.

You can place a bench or add small paths of turf grass along your wildflowers and growing areas. You can include "Do not mow" or "Pollinator habitat" signage to edges of your property so that neighbors can acknowledge what you're doing.

Reach out to neighbors directly or contact your neighborhood association. Educate others on the beauty and benefits of rewilding. It can cost less - for you and the environment. But it's all voluntary. You must educate yourself before beginning the process.

"The first step is connecting to nature. If you don't have an emotional relationship to something, you won't reap the full rewards, like seeing Monarch butterflies, fireflies, and flocks of birds using your landscape," says Perkins.

Perkins offers many educational opportunities as "The Personal Ecologist", from generational walks on family farms to consulting services and presentations.



HYDROSEEDING: THE FAST-TRACK TO A LUSH LAWN

Hydroseeding is a fast, efficient method of planting grass using a slurry of seed, water, fertilizer, mulch, and a tackifier (a glue-like substance that helps everything stick to the soil). This mixture is sprayed over prepared soil using a specialized hose or tank.

It's often used for large areas or in situations where traditional seeding or laying sod might not be ideal.

Benefits of Hydroseeding

- Quick coverage: Great for large lawns, slopes, or areas with erosion issues.
- Cost-effective: More affordable than sod, especially for big spaces.
- Better seed-to-soil contact: The slurry helps seeds stay in place and retain moisture, improving germination.
- Erosion control: Especially helpful on hillsides or construction sites where loose soil needs stabilization.
- Custom blends: You can tailor the seed mix for sun, shade, or Maine's specific climate and soil conditions.

Best Time to Hydroseed in Maine

- Late spring (May-early June) or early fall (late August-mid-September) is ideal.
 - You want:
 - Warm soil temps (50–65°F)
- Reliable moisture (either from rain or irrigation)
 - Cooler air temps than midsum-



mer, which helps avoid drying out

Avoid peak summer heat and dry spells, unless you can commit to frequent watering.

When Should You Use Hydroseeding?

- Starting a lawn from scratch (new construction or total lawn renovation)
- Repairing large damaged areas (post-construction, erosion, or storm damage)
- Seeding sloped or uneven terrain
- Covering up excavation, septic system installs, or utility work
- When you want faster results than dry seeding, but sod is too costly **Aftercare**

- Keep the area consistently moist for the first few weeks.
- Avoid walking on it while the new grass is establishing.
- First mow usually happens around 3–4 inches tall (usually 3–4 weeks post-application, depending on conditions).

In short: If you need to seed a large or tricky area and want quick, even results with less labor than sod and better performance than traditional seeding, hydroseeding might be your best bet. Want help determining if your property is a good candidate? A local lawn care or hydroseeding pro can assess your site. <

MULCH: WHEN AND WHERE

The best time to mulch is in the spring, typically late April to early May, once the soil has warmed up slightly but before weeds have a chance to take hold. Mulching too early can trap cold moisture in the soil and delay plant growth. A second round of mulching in the fall, around late October, can help insulate plant roots against harsh winter temperatures and reduce soil erosion.

Where you mulch depends on your garden's layout and goals. Around trees and shrubs, maintain a mulch ring several inches from the trunk to retain moisture and suppress weeds. In flower and vegetable beds, apply mulch between rows and around plant bases to keep soil temperatures steady and reduce watering needs. Use organic materials like bark mulch, straw, shredded leaves, or composted wood chips to gradually enrich the soil as they break down.

Avoid piling mulch too high or too close to plant stems, as this can lead to rot and pest issues. A 2–3 inch layer is generally ideal. Proper mulching not only supports healthy plants through the growing season but also helps your landscape thrive year-round.



SPRING IN MAINE: SIGNS OF PESTS IN YOUR YARD AND WHEN TO CALL A PROFESSIONAL

As the snow melts and the days grow warmer, Maine yards begin to wake up—with new growth, birdsong, and unfortunately, pests. From tiny insects to larger burrowing critters, spring is the season when many yard invaders emerge or become active. Early detection is key to protecting your lawn, garden, and even your home.

Here's how to spot the signs of spring pest activity in Maine—and when it's time to handle it yourself versus when you should call in the pros.

1. Tunneling and Mounds: Moles and Voles

5. Burrows and Holes: Skunks, Groundhogs, and Chipmunks

Holes in the ground can be caused by a variety of critters, including skunks, groundhogs, and chipmunks. *DIY fixes*:

- Seal small entry points under sheds and porches.
- Use scent-based repellents or motion-sensing lights.

Call a professional if:

- You suspect an animal is living under your deck, porch, or garage.
- You see repeated digging near your home's foundation.

You're concerned about safety (especially with skunks).

General Rule: Call a Professional When...

• You can't identify the pest or the problem persists despite your efforts.

The issue is damaging property, like wiring, siding, or major lawn areas.

- Safety is a concern, such as when dealing with wasp nests, skunks, or signs of infestation near your home's structure

TICK ALERT: RISING CASES AND PROTECTIVE MEASURES

Maine has experienced a significant increase in tick-borne diseases over the past two years, with 2024 marking a record high. This surge underscores the importance of proactive measures to protect yourself, your family, and your pets from tick bites and the illnesses they can transmit.

Tick-Borne Disease Trends in

- Lyme Disease: In 2024, Maine reported 3,218 cases of Lyme disease, surpassing the previous record of 2,943 cases in 2023.
- Anaplasmosis: Cases increased from 777 in 2023 to 1,284 in 2024.
- Babesiosis: Reported cases rose from 194 in 2023 to 310 in 2024.
- Powassan Virus: A rare but serious illness, with seven cases reported

in 2023—the highest on record for the

PREVENTATIVE MEASURES Personal Protection:

• Use EPA-Approved Repellents:

- Apply repellents containing at least 20% DEET, picaridin, IR3535, or oil of lemon eucalyptus on exposed skin.
- Treat Clothing and Gear: Use products containing permethrin on clothing and gear; these remain effective through several washes. Maine
- Dress Appropriately: Wear long sleeves, long pants tucked into socks, and light-colored clothing to spot ticks more easily.
- Perform Regular Tick Checks: After outdoor activities, thoroughly check your body, clothing, and gear for ticks. Pay special attention to areas like under the arms, behind the knees, around the ears, and in the hair.

Property Management:

- Maintain Your Yard: Keep grass short, remove leaf litter, and clear tall grasses and brush around homes and at the edge of lawns.
 - Create Tick-Safe Zones: Place a

3-foot wide barrier of wood chips or gravel between lawns and wooded areas to restrict tick migration.

• Discourage Deer: Use fencing to keep deer, which can carry ticks, away from your yard.

When to Call a Professional

If you're experiencing any of the following, it's advisable to consult a pest control professional:

- Persistent Tick Presence: Regular sightings of ticks on your property despite personal preventive measures.
- High-Risk Areas: Living in or near wooded or brushy areas known for high tick populations.
- Previous Tick-Borne Illnesses: If you or family members have previously contracted tick-borne diseases, reducing exposure risk is crucial.

ALWAYS PERFORM A SPRING TREE CHECK

In early spring, it can be tricky to tell whether a bare tree in your yard is dead, dying, or simply taking its

burns cleaner and longer.

sweet time to wake up after another long Maine winter. While some species leaf out early, like maples and willows, others, such as oaks and ash, can lag well into late May before showing signs of life.

So how do you know if it's time to call an arborist or just be patient?

Here's how to tell if a tree needs to come down, or if it just needs a little more time and TLC.

Late Bloomer or Lifeless? Know the Difference

Just because a tree hasn't leafed out yet doesn't mean it's dead. Temperature swings and soil conditions can affect blooming times. Before rushing into removal, check for these signs of life.

- Scratch Test: Use your fingernail or a small knife to lightly scratch the bark of a small branch. If the layer underneath is green and moist, your tree is still alive.
- Buds vs. Barren: Look closely at the tips of branches. Are there small buds, even if they're not open yet? That's a good sign the tree is just a bit behind schedule.
- Flexibility: Gently bend a few smaller twigs. Live ones are flexible and bend without snapping. Dead ones will break cleanly and feel brittle.

Signs a Tree May Need to Come Down

If you're noticing any of the following, your tree may be hazardous and

should be evaluated by a certified arborist:

- No buds at all by late spring (end of May to early June)
- Large branches that are cracked, split, or hanging
- Mushrooms or fungus growing at the base of the trunk (a sign of internal rot)
- Peeling bark, deep vertical cracks, or holes from pests
- A pronounced lean, especially if the roots look like they're lifting on one side
- Sudden leaf drop or leaf discoloration on just one side of the tree

Remember, a dead or structurally compromised tree isn't just unsightly, it's dangerous. Falling limbs or whole trees can cause property damage, power outages, or injuries during spring and summer storms.

When to Call in a Pro: Tree removal is not a DIY task. If you suspect a tree is dead or hazardous contact one of the many licensed arborist in this section to assess it. Most offer free consultations. Don't wait until hurricane or thunderstorm season, removal companies get very busy after the first big storm. If the tree is near your home, power lines, or public roads, removal may require special permits or coordination with utility companies. <

How to Attract Hummingbirds in Maine

Boil the mixture to dissolve the sugar, cool it, and refill feeders every 2–3 days (daily during hot weather).

Clean feeders thoroughly each time to prevent mold or bacteria.

3. Create a Hummingbird-Friendly Habitat

Provide shelter with trees, shrubs, or even tall native grasses.

Add a misting fountain or shallow water source for bathing and cooling

Avoid pesticides—these harm both hummingbirds and the insects they sometimes feed on for protein.

Fun Hummingbird Facts You Might Not Know

- They're true long-distance flyers: Maine's ruby-throated hummingbirds migrate over 2,000 miles—including a nonstop flight across the Gulf of Mexico.
- They remember you: Hummingbirds can recognize individual people and will return to the same feeders year after year if they're treated well!
- They have excellent memories: Hummingbirds remember which flowers they've visited and when they'll refill with nectar.
- They can hover and fly backwards: Thanks to unique shoulder

joints, they're the only birds that can fly in all directions—even upside down!

• They're tiny but mighty: A ruby-throated hummingbird weighs about the same as a nickel but can beat its wings over 50 times per sec-






2. Inspect equipment. Check for loose belts and missing or damaged parts. Replace any parts needed or take your equipment to a qualified service representative for servicing.

3. Drain old fuel. Never leave fuel sitting in the gas tank of your equipment for more than 30 days. Untreat-

ed gasoline (without a fuel stabilizer) left in the system will deteriorate, which may cause starting or running problems and, in some cases, significant damage to the fuel system.

4. Protect your power by using only E10 or less fuel in outdoor power equipment. Some gas stations may offer 15 percent ethanol (E15) gas or higher-ethanol fuel blends but any fuel containing more than 10 percent ethanol can damage and is illegal to use in-small engine equipment not designed for it.

5. Store fuel safely. Label your fuel can with the date of purchase and ethanol content of the fuel. Never put "old" gas in your outdoor power equipment. If you don't know the date of purchase, dispose of the fuel in the can safely and buy fresh fuel. Always store fuel out of the reach of children


or pets and in approved containers.

6. Clean equipment. Remove any dirt, oil or grass stuck to it. Clean equipment will run more efficiently and last longer.

CHIMNEY CLEANING: WHAT TO LOOK FOR THIS SPRING

As the snow melts and the wood stove goes quiet for the season, it's easy to forget about your chimney. But spring is actually the perfect time for a chimney check-up. After months of heavy use and exposure to harsh winter weather, your chimney may need cleaning, repairs, or preventative maintenance.

Here's what to look for this spring to make sure your chimney is safe, clean, and ready for next season.

1. Creosote Buildup

If you burned wood throughout the winter, creosote buildup is almost guaranteed. This sticky, flammable residue lines the inside of your chimney and is the leading cause of chimney fires. A quick flashlight check inside the flue can show you if there's a thick, black coating (it can look shiny, flaky, or tar-like). If you see even a quarter-inch of buildup, it's time to schedule a cleaning.

Tip: Don't try to clean it yourself unless you have the right tools and experience. A certified chimney sweep has specialized brushes and vacuums to safely remove creosote.

2. Cracks or Damage in the Masonry

Maine winters are brutal on bricks and mortar. Freeze-thaw cycles can cause cracking or crumbling in the chimney structure, especially near the crown or the top few rows. In spring, walk around your home and check for:

- Missing or cracked bricks
- Loose or crumbling mortar joints
- White, chalky stains (a sign of water damage called efflorescence)

Left unchecked, moisture damage can lead to serious structural problems — and expensive repairs down the line.

3. Chimney Cap and Crown Issues

The chimney cap (a protective cover) keeps out rain, animals, and debris. The crown (the concrete slab at the top) prevents water from seeping into the chimney structure. Both are essential to chimney health. In spring, look for:

- A missing or tilted chimney cap
- Rust or deterioration on a metal cap
- Cracks in the crown or signs of pooling water

A damaged or missing cap also invites nesting birds and small critters. No one wants a surprise raccoon in their flue come fall!

4. Signs of Moisture Inside

Check the area around your fireplace or stove for signs of water intrusion — peeling wallpaper, damp smells, or staining. Moisture entering through the chimney could be a result of flashing failure (where the chimney meets the roof) or damaged bricks/ mortar. Spring is a great time to fix this before Maine's summer thunderstorms roll in.

5. Rust or Damage in Your Fireplace or Stove

Rust on your damper, firebox, or stove pipe? That's a sign water is getting where it shouldn't. It could mean your cap isn't doing its job or your flue has cracks. Addressing these issues now can prevent further corrosion or damage to your heating system.

Chimney maintenance isn't just about keeping things clean — it's about keeping your home and family safe. Spring inspections catch problems early, save money, and ensure your chimney is ready for cozy fires next fall

- Medicinal: Anti-inflammatory; may help with digestion and anxiety.

Tip: Needs warmth and sun, plant after the last frost.

The car accident (with subliminal advertising)

Monday has never been my favorite day of the week, so I shouldn't have been surprised that a snowplow tore off most of Andy Young, Columnist my car's rear bumper

on one of them this past February. I hadn't planned on that happening, but there's a reason that motor vehicle mishaps are referred to as "accidents."

While I had my rental, a Toyota Prius with Maryland license plates, I used the most distant parking lot spots, drove the least-traveled roads available, and totally avoided parallel parking. Naturally the number of drivers who darted out of side streets without warning, stopped suddenly in front of me for no apparent reason, or changed lanes on the highway in my vicinity without signaling, began increasing at an exponential rate.

However, against all odds, after



27 days I brought the car back to the agency in the same condition it was in when I borrowed it. The sigh of relief I let out when I returned it was probably audible in both New Hampshire and New Brunswick. I had taken an uncharacteristic gam-

ble on myself ... and won!

But why do I consider an accident that sidelined my car for nearly a month lucky? Well, for starters, I'm just as healthy physically as I was before the incident. I also learned I can still, when necessary, handle inconvenience and adversity. And best of all I met Travis the snowplow driver, Ashley the car rental agent, and Ken the autobody specialist, three exceptionally kind, hard-working, innately decent people whose paths I most likely would never have crossed had it not been for that crash early on a snowy

More than eight months remain in 2025, so it's possible there are still some days ahead when I'll get even luckier than I did on Feb. 3. But if I'm truly fortunate, I won't get that lucky again anytime soon. <

"We had some trouble offensively in the beginning, but from there we picked it up and the important thing was we kept our energy up. We did well defensively. Just getting out there, being with the team, healthy environment really. Even when we get down on ourselves there's always someone there to pick us up, no matter what. I think little things defensively need work; like how we're fielding the ball, offensively just keeping our heads in, but I think as a team we did very well."

This was a learning scrimmage and an opportunity for both teams to practice how they'd react offensively, so after a scoreless first inning runners were placed on base.

Oxford Hills scored in the top of the third inning to take a 1-0 lead.

But Windham senior Kylie Harvie reached base on an error in the third inning with junior Nola Bryant advancing to second base. Senior Chole Edwards singled to center field scoring Bryant and the scrimmage was tied 1-1.

In the fourth inning WHS senior Kennedy Kimball singled to centerfield, but advanced to third base and drove in two runs.

From that point on, run after run crossed the plate for Windham. In the fifth inning, junior Addison Caiazzo singled on a bunt and brought in Bryant.

In the bottom of the sixth inning, junior Jezebelle Pinto sent the ball to center field, and it dropped behind the fence for her first varsity home run.

"I was just trying to get a base hit," said Pinto. "It was the best feeling ever, all my hard work paid off. I think we all did pretty good; we were amazing on the basepath, adjusting to the pitcher and staying back on that ball, we adjusted really well on that and just as a team. There was a lot of good defense in the infield; no balls really got past anyone. Pitchers did great. I think we're going to be going for it this season."

After Pinto's home run, junior Lacie Higgins doubled, and freshman Yani Kostopoulos singled bringing in Higgins

"We've got to put those baserun-

ners on just to see how our defense reacts with the little pressure there could be, it's good for them to experience it in April than in June," said Windham varsity softball coach Darcey Gardiner. "I'm really, really happy with the defense; our communication was there, our backup on bases was there. One thing I would like to see us do a little bit better is adjusting to batters with different pitchers.

"Everyone went up there and put together good at-bats, before this scrimmage I had a really good idea (of who I was putting in the batting order), after this scrimmage it's nice to see how difficult everyone made it for me. When everyone does their job, it makes my job harder – which is a good thing. If we can put the ball in play, we've got speed and smart baserunning to pick us up there."

Gardiner said this scrimmage says a lot of good things and Windham's at-bats during practices are just like game at-bats.

Windham opens the 2025 season at home at 11 a.m. Friday, April 25 against Bonny Eagle. <



Chicken Noodle Casserole

Ideal for hectic weeknights, this hearty casserole is creamy, cheesy, and delicious! It's a great way to use up leftover chicken, too. This is one of our favorite family dinners.

Prep Time: 10 minutes • Cook Time: 25 minutes • Total Time: 35 minutes Servings: 6

INGREDIENTS

2 cans of cream soup, or 2 cups of homemade Cream Soup Substitute (20 ounces)

1 cup of milk 1/2 teaspoon of garlic powder 1/2 teaspoon of onion powder 1 teaspoon of dried thyme

kosher salt and black pepper, to taste 2 cups of frozen vegetables 4 cups cooked chicken 12 ounces of egg noodles cooked according to the package directions 1 cup of shredded cheddar cheese, divided Cooking spray

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Use cooking spray on a 9 x 13 baking dish. In a large bowl, combine the milk, cream soup, and seasonings. Stir in the cooked chicken and frozen vegetables with 1/4 cup of the shredded cheese. Gently fold cooked egg noodles into the creamy chicken mixture. Transfer the noodle mixture into the prepared baking dish. Top with the remaining cheese. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes until the casserole is heated through and the cheese is melted on top.

Note: This recipe can also be made using leftover holiday ham or turkey. You can also use ground chicken or chicken thighs. I've even made it with ground sausage. It's so good!


