# Doctorate degree launches civilian Navy career for Windham High grad

Sierra Yost is following her dreams and is surely bound for bigger things in life but right now she's relaxing with her family in Windham and enjoying some well-deserved time off before starting a new job in three weeks, working as a Material Engineer for the Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division in China

A 2016 graduate of Windham High School, Yost, 27, graduated as the 2020 College of Engineering's valedictorian at the University of Maine at Orono and then went on to earn a doctorate degree in chemical engineering at Penn State University. She was inspired to study chemical engineering after taking the AP Chemistry class there taught by former WHS teacher Lisa McClellan.

"I knew I wanted to do research and development as a chemical engineer, and a PhD makes you much more qualified to do so," Yost said. "I was able to take a lot of AP classes at Windham High, which prepared me for studying and understanding the material in my chemical engineering classes at UMaine and

Penn State."

Yost said that while she was at UMaine, she was able to work at a paper mill coop, focusing on Research and Development, which led her to decide that she wanted to get her doctorate degree.

"Additionally, I was able to do a research-based honors thesis while there, which taught me the basics of research in an academic setting." she said.

In 2021, Yost was awarded the Department of Defense Science, Mathematics, and Research for Transformation Scholarship. Recipients of the SMART award receive full tuition for up to five years, summer internships, a stipend and full-time employment with the Department of Defense after graduation. It was a unique opportunity which

provided her with hands-on experience at one of the nation's most innovative Department of Defense laboratories and working under an experienced mentor while gaining

valuable technical skills.

"SMART is a scholarship-for-service program, so I owe four years as a DoD civilian to the Navy," she said. According to Yost, the biggest dif-

ference between her undergraduate studies at UMaine and her doctorate studies at Penn State were the things she learned about researching.

# Diamond leaves a legacy of exceptional public service and dedication to community

There's an old saying that "to live in hearts we leave behind is not to die" and for Windham's beloved state legislator, educator and businessman Bill Diamond that expression rings true.

Diamond, 80, passed away Sunday, Aug. 31 after a hard-fought battle with cancer and the outpouring of kind words and sentiment for him and his family has been non-stop. Having spent more than 40 years in politics and service as Maine's Secretary of State from 1989 to 1997, Diamond leaves behind a legacy few will equal.

A lifelong Democrat, Diamond first ran for the Maine House of Representatives in 1976 as a write-in candidate and defeated Republican Barbara Strong. He won re-election for the seat in 1978 by defeating Republican Carole Bean. He won a third term in the Maine House in 1980 while running unopposed. In 1982, he beat Republican David Huber to win a Maine State Senate seat representing Windham, and he then defeated Republican Ken Cole in 1984 to win re-election before stepping down from the legislature at that time.

He grew up on his grandfather's

farm in West Gardiner and came to Southern Maine to study to become a teacher at Gorham State Teacher's College, earning a bachelor's degree and master's degree in education. He married his wife Jane in 1968, and the couple raised two daughters, Kristin and Karyn, in Windham and now have eight grandchildren. His actual

first name was George but preferred to be known by his middle name, William

Many students in Windham and Raymond will recall Diamond as their school principal or teacher. He taught from 1968 to 1986 in Windham schools and was the first principal of Windham's Manchester School. He went on to lead Field-Allen Junior High School and Windham Middle School as principal and was Superintendent of Schools for Raymond. Diamond also served as superintendent and director of governmental relations for the controversial Elan School in Poland.

His interests varied outside of politics and education. He earned a brown belt in karate and was the owner of the now-closed *Windham Independent* newspaper. He was also a long-time co-owner of AllMed Staffing of New England in Windham and owned a security business for many years in town.

Before becoming Maine's 45th Secretary of State in 1989, Diamond threw his hat into the ring in a bid to become governor in 1986 and then campaigned for the 1st Congressional District position in the U.S. House of Representatives in 1994, losing in the Democratic Primary.

In 2004, Diamond defeated Republican Joe Bruno of Raymond to win the Maine Senate District 12

# **Scent O'Mental**

It's kind of funny when I think of things I can remember vividly from my childhood more than six decades after they happened. In a way, our memory is comparable to a computer in which our brains capture sensory information, store it away, and then can bring it back to the forefront when needed. In my case, I have been blessed with a great memory and even in my advanced age, I can recall trivial and insignificant events from years past.

I happened to think of this the other day when I was shopping at the supermarket and was in the dairy aisle. Passing by the refrigerated cheese section, I recalled a certain type of cheese was the brunt of many jokes when I was a child. The pungent odor of limburger cheese smells terrible and was the source of an ongoing Three Stooges comedy routine on television. I can recall smelling it myself at school and remember how bad it was even though that was close to 65 years ago.

Despite the passing of time, I haven't smelled limburger cheese since, yet I can remember that experience and consider that to be truly amazing. As an adult I have never purchased limburger cheese and haven't seen it at any of the stores I have shopped in. It might be on the shelf there somewhere, but it isn't a commodity I would go searching for.

The arrival of every spring in Rochester, New York where I grew up is marked by the blooming of lilacs in Highland Park and the annual Lilac Festival. Our family used to go every Memorial Day Weekend to see more than 1,800 lilacs in

majestic shades of purple and white at the event. Along with the visuals, one of the things I remember the most about the Lilac Festival was the sweet smell of the lilac flowers. It wasn't an overpowering aroma, but a pleasant one that captivated my senses, and one I still enjoy.

My sense of smell is directly connected to my memory and it's more than recalling the odor of limburger cheese and lilacs.

Back in the 1950s and 1960s, my mother was a stay-at-home mom who did all the cooking for our family. When I was in first grade, she instituted something she called "Vegetable of the Day," introducing us to as many different types of vegetables as she could find, one at a time with each supper.

My younger brother and I were not allowed to opt out of this program. We were made to try each one of them we were served, and it has led to a dislike of the taste of many vegetables for me that persists to this day.

Under the "Vegetable of the Day" regimen, I recall eating asparagus, spinach, artichoke, broccoli, beets, carrots and cabbage. We also ate cauliflower, eggplant, corn, green beans, wax beans, kale, lettuce, collard greens and peas. Our mother prepared squash (both orange and yellow), rutabaga, radishes, green peppers, rhubarb, sweet potatoes, turnips, tomatoes, brussels sprouts, and zucchini.

But one afternoon when I was in second grade, I got off the school bus and raced home to hit up the cookie jar on the kitchen counter. As I entered our house through the back door to the garage, I caught a whiff of a smell that instantly turned my stomach.

Dear old mom was frying some parsnips in a pan on the stove for "Vegetable of the Day." The rank smell became indelibly imprinted upon my brain that afternoon and continues to strike fear in me even years later. The foul odor of fried parsnips also evokes having to sit at the dinner table and having to eat it.

My mother would watch us and our dinner plates to ensure that my brother and I consumed every last bite of her vegetables each evening, and I struggled mightily this time with her heaping serving of fried parsnips. I think the reason I remember eating those after six decades have passed is that when dinner was over and I was excused from the table, I stepped out into our backyard, and I remember being ill to the point of projectile vomiting chewed pieces of fried parsnips into the grass.

Once when I was serving in the U.S Air Force in Germany, I went to a local restaurant and was waiting for my meal to arrive when I began to smell something that I hadn't experienced in many years. Apparently, the couple dining at the next table had ordered and were eating fried parsnips, and that smell had wafted over to my table. Just like years previously, the smell started to make me feel sick to my stomach, so I got up from the table, left money for what I had ordered on the table and then departed quickly. Being outside and away from the smell, mu stomach

slowly seemed to recover.

Scientific research has shown that memories associated with smell carry more emotion than visual memories and that's something that I can certainly assert as fact.

Some of my childhood memories are directly linked to certain smells and I suppose one could say that fried parsnips are my personal kryptonite. <

# Age Friendly Windham prepares for free luncheon

Age-Friendly Windham, a town-supported volunteer group that is working to build a multi-generational healthy community, is hosting a community luncheon discussing fire safety, fitness and how to avoid fraud for residents.

The "Aging at Home: Ready, Safe and Connected" presentation will be conducted from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 16 in the Windham Town Hall gymnasium on School Road in Windham. The cost is free, but donations will be accepted.

Erica Bell-Watkins, Windham Age Friendly Coordinator, says that during the luncheon, the American Red Cross will give a fire safety presentation and AARP will lead a discussion about home fitness. Representatives of Cumberland County Federal Credit Union will also give a presentation about fraud prevention.

The luncheon is sponsored by Age Friendly Windham, Windham Parks and Recreation Department, and Cumberland County Federal Credit Union. Others making important contributions to the luncheon are the Southern Maine Agency on Aging,

the Windham Fire-Rescue Department, and the Sebago Lakes Region Fuller Center for Housing.

"This is an opportunity to hear from multiple perspectives and different organizations about what to plan for as you age in place," Watkins-Bell said. "We are hoping to provide options and resources to our aging population for what the best options are for them to age safely and comfortably in their homes."

Back in 2019, Maine was designated as an Age Friendly State, joining many cities and communities across the globe who are committed to becoming more inclusive of people of all ages. Maine is part of the AARP Network of Age Friendly States and Communities and the World Health Organization's Global Network for Age Friendly Cities and Communities.

Being designated as an Age Friendly state means communities such as Windham are encouraged to plan and implement strategies that best fit the assets and opportunities of their state and community, as well as embrace and assess multiple domains of livability.

According to Bell-Watkins, Age Friendly Windham is a diverse group

of dedicated volunteers working to help members in the community to live and age in place and is dedicated to maintaining the independence of our town's residents and helping them thrive.

She said that its mission is to:

Partner with local and regional organizations and volunteer groups to increase services and programs that make it possible for residents of all ages and abilities to live and thrive in Windham.

Provide activities geared toward keeping people healthy, active, and engaged in our community.

Advise the Windham Town Council about infrastructure and policy that will make it easier and safer for Windham residents to live in our community.

"Currently we have a transportation program, a disaster preparedness program, a "Lunch and Learn" series and work with several other departments on shared initiatives like technology access and education," Bell-Watkins said.

Among new initiatives that Age Friendly Windham is planning include piloting a home safety check program, a window dressers program





# Tennis tournament to benefit local ALS support

Tennis champion Pete Sampras wasn't thinking specifically about Windham when he shared his thoughts about the game, but a statement he once made describes an upcoming event here perfectly. "Tennis uses the language of life. Advantage, service, fault, love – the basic elements of tennis are those of everyday existence, because every match is a life in miniature," Sampras said.

Bill Gallant has been part of a group of up to 16 people playing tennis in Windham for more than two decades and along the way he's made plenty of friends on the courts at Windham High School but none more special than Phil Swan. Over the years, the two have become close friends and worked together at Sappi Warren before Bill's retirement.

A few months ago, Phil learned that he has been diagnosed with Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a rare neurodegenerative condition that results in the progressive loss of both upper and lower motor neurons that control voluntary muscle contraction, movement, and breathing. Prominent individuals who have lost their lives to ALS include baseball star Lou Gehrig and physicist Stephen Hawking.

Gallant and his tennis friends are a tight group, playing outdoors in the summer and indoors during the winter months, and they were shocked to hear about Phil's diagnosis.

"We all immediately wanted to do something to help Phil but he's an

extremely proud man and wouldn't accept our help," Gallant said. "We wanted to hold a tennis tournament while the weather's still good to raise money to assist Phil with his treatment but wouldn't take any of it."

So instead of donating proceeds from a tennis tournament directly to Phil, the group decided to stage a tournament in Windham named for their friend and donate whatever is collected to a local ALS charity in Maine that offers advocacy opportunities, virtual support groups, and ongoing emotional support and logistical guidance for families impacted by ALS.

Sponsored by Windham Parks and Recreation, the Phil Swan ALS Tennis Tournament will be held at 9 a.m. Sunday, Sept. 7 at the Windham High School Tennis Courts and runs all day.

"Right now, we have 20 teams competing in the tournament," Gallant said. "It will be a mixed doubles tournament

and a double-elimination event."

A food truck will be at the site for those who want to come and watch the tournament.

"I guess I've known about ALS for a long time," Gallant said. "It's a terrible disease and now it's hit close to home and our friend Phil, whom I have known for 25 years."

According to Gallant, the game of tennis is a way of life for everyone in-

volved with the Windham group.

"Tennis is a great sport," he said. "It brings the community together in an atmosphere of friendship and laughter. We have players of all ages, and we even have someone who plays who is 89 years old. It truly is a sport you can play all your life."

The group organizing the tournament to do something in their friend Phil's name is grateful to Windham Parks and Recreation for helping them with the tournament and to RSU 14 for the use of their courts for the fundraiser.

The entry fee for teams competing in the tournament is \$100 and there is still time left to enter and compete. To register, send an email to bburnham2@hotmail.com or to amyjuned@gmail.com

"We are doing what we can because Phil is such a great guy and are hoping whatever we can raise from this tournament will help prevent this happening to anyone else," Gallant said. "Our tennis group is all about friendship and this is such a sad situation happening to our friend. We couldn't just stand by and do nothing." <

tistry in Windham to serve cat and dog





# Senators discuss challenges facing childcare providers

tor Tim Nangle, D-Windham, Maine Sen-President Mattie Daughtry, D-Brunswick, met with childcare providers from Space to Thrive in Windham and Raymond during a beach day at Sebago Lake State Park last month.

Nangle and Daughtry heard directly from local childcare staff members about the challenges they face and the support they need to continue this critical work.

"It was a memorable day listening to the staff from Space to Thrive share their experiences," Nangle said. "I walked away deeply moved by their dedication and concerned by the challenges they face. These jobs are essential, yet the people doing them are stretched thin and too often underappreciated. We owe it to them, and to Maine families, to keep looking for



ways to strengthen our childcare system."

Space to Thrive is a nonprofit that serves families in Windham Raymond through both early childhood education school-age care. During the providers spoke about work-

force shortages, funding challenges and the importance of programs that support both educators and parents.

'What stood out to me was how much these programs mean to local families," Nangle said. "The challenges are real, but so is the commitment of the people doing the work every day. What I heard from these childcare professionals will stick with me and guide my work in the legislature."

Maine is facing an ongoing childcare crisis that is driven by insufficient supply of providers and facilities, high costs for families, and low

wages for childcare workers. All of these issues have created a major economic drain, costing Maine millions annually in lost productivity and revenue as childcare providers struggle with low pay and inconsistent state reimbursements, while families find it difficult to afford basic care.

Wage data cited from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics are telling and reveal that the childcare sector nationally has become less competitive relative to other low-paying occupations when compared to a thriving and competitive labor market and it continues to be less attractive for potential workers.

In 2021, there were only nine occupations with median wages lower than those of childcare workers and

in 2022, there were only five. Coming out of the pandemic, childcare jobs did not become more competitive when compared to any of other occupations or to other essential care and education occupations that require highly skilled work but paying lower wages.

Besides not being financially beneficial for many providers, childcare in Maine is becoming outlandishly expensive for families. A statewide survey recently indicated that a married couple in Maine with a single child is spending 11 percent of their family income on childcare expenses. The federal average for affordable childcare nationally is 7 percent of a family's income.

Childcare center owners in Maine are not currently able to raise wages without shifting costs to families and many of these parents are struggling to afford childcare and make basic ends meet. This has thrown the state childcare system into a crisis where many parents, including Windham and Raymond, are experiencing closures and ever-increasing waitlists.

A survey conducted by the National Association for the Education of Young Children has revealed that 85 percent of childcare centers in Maine face staffing shortages, with low wages being the primary impediment to recruitment.

Daughtry is currently conducting a Statewide Child Care Listening Tour that includes stops at community childcare centers, public pre-K partnerships, Head Start programs

and nonprofit organizations across the state. The goal is to spotlight innovative solutions, identify gaps in service and elevate the voices of those most impacted by Maine's childcare crisis. Along with the listening tour, parents, businesses and early educators are invited to complete a survey to share their childcare experiences at www.tinyurl.com/supportkidssupportmaine.

The insights gathered from the survey and the listening tour will help inform future legislation and policy aimed at expanding access to high-quality, affordable childcare for all Maine families, Nangle said. <





# The secret(s) to good writing

The 2025-2026 school year has begun, which means I'll again be trying to convince high school students of the importance of writing, and then attempting to help them become better at it.

But strong writing skills are beneficial to people of all ages, and with that in mind I've generously decided to share some vital writing tips with a select group, specifically the thoughtful readers of The Windham Eagle.

1. Proofread your writing careful-

ly and do it OUT LOUD! That way you'll avoid any awkward or repetitive sentences.

- 2. When you take a break, DON'T DELETE ANYTHING! Some of the best writing you'll ever produce will involve completing something you had started weeks, months, or years earlier.
- 3. Write early in the morning when your mind is clear, and drink 20 ounces of water (spiked with a teaspoon of vinegar) before you start.

- 7. Never plagiarize or use trite, overused cliches, like I just did on the previous tip.
- 8. Don't edit your first draft as you go, unless doing so helps control your OCD.
- 9. Don't assume your reader's attention span is (or readers' attention spans are) any longer than yours.
- 10. Don't assume that you're any smarter than the people who'll read your writing. But don't assume they're any smarter than you are, either.
- 11. Be aware of the audience you're writing for. Baby Boomers don't care about Kendrick Lamar, Megan Thee Stallion or Killer Mike any more than Gen Zer's do about Kate Smith, Perry Como, or Soupy Sales.
  - 12. Keep in mind that a 1.000-word

essay is pretty long. Twelve-hundred words constitutes a short story. Anything over that is technically considered a novella.

- 13. Sometimes it's best to write your opening and your conclusion first and then fill in the middle.
- 14. Always try to attempt to avoid using too many extraneous, superfluous, unneeded, redundant, extra unnecessary words in your writing.
- 15. Avoid using pompous, grandiloquent, pretentious, bombastic verbiage and utterances when simple, uncomplicated, straightforward, basic words and phrases will do.
- 16. Ask a friend, parent, child, employer, or hitchhiker you picked up to proofread your writing. (Note: this tip is not intended to be an endorsement of picking up hitchhikers.)
- 17. Ask someone you trust for feedback, but only if you're prepared to absorb honest feedback.
- 18. If you're having fun, you're probably working on a good essay. And even if it's not so good, who cares? You're having fun!
- 19. Journaling is great therapy. It's also a lot cheaper than regular therapy! <

seat and won re-election in 2006, 2008 and 2010 before being term limited. Four years later in 2014, Diamond defeated Republican Kaile Warren to win the Maine Senate District 26 seat and subsequently won re-election to that position in 2016, 2018, and 2020.

As the cost of heating homes rose in the early 2000s, Diamond co-founded and served as president of Windham Neighbors Helping Neighbors in 2007, an all-volunteer effort which raised money to provide emergency heating oil to community residents in need. He also served as a board member for the Maine State Society for the Protection of Animals in Windham and Hospice of Southern Maine.

Before leaving political office in 2022, Diamond was known statewide as a staunch advocate for children and led Maine Senate investigations into prominent deaths of abused children whose families were relegated to the state's child welfare system. In 2014, Diamond wrote a book about the subject called "The Evil and the Innocent."

In 2023, Diamond launched the "Walk A Mile In Their Shoes Foundation," a non-profit dedicated to preventing child homicides and the abuse of children who are under the supervision or direct care of the State of Maine or who are or have been associated with the state's Child Protective System.

"Children associated with state care have been dying at record levels, in fact, as recently as 2021 a record number of children died, many were victims of child homicides," Diamond said at the time. "The chilling question is: How many more children must die before we make meaningful

He said he was first made aware of the issues affecting child homicide in Maine and the state's child protection system in 2001.


"The problem has continued to persist over the past 22 years under four different gubernatorial administrations, Independent, Republican, and Democrat," he said in launching the foundation. "The problems are not partisan based. They are the concern of all of us. This is the most important thing I've ever been able to do, nothing comes close."

One of the purposes of the foundation will be to bring people from a variety of interests and backgrounds together to develop meaningful strategies for positive changes to protect children who are the innocent victims of a broken system and to work with the Department of Health and Human Services and the Office of Child and Family Services in a joint effort to improve the state's child safety policies and practices and truly make a difference.

"We really don't want to think about these children because it cuts deeply into our souls," Diamond said earlier this year. "But we must if we want to help."

In June, Diamond made his final public appearance at the 2025 Windham Summerfest Parade as he was honored as the Modern Woodmen of America's Hometown Hero for 2025.





Please reference The Windham Eagle's Letter to the Editor from Anne Glotchshuk of Windham published on Aug. 15, 2025.

Thank you for supporting, in principle, "requiring identification to vote in an election." I appreciate that you are in favor of Voter ID.

The Voter ID referendum does include absentee ballot reforms but does not "scrap absentee voting." To ensure that ballots are securely distributed to the valid addresses of registered voters, the improvement requires voters to request a ballot each election cycle. Automatic absentee ballot mail-

ings are risky - people move, or sadly, pass away. You will be able to request an absentee ballot, to continue to vote absentee as you always have, and you will not lose that convenience.

The reform ensures one person, one vote - with verification and accountability. The intent is to fix a few flaws in the election process and ensure that your absentee voting experience is unchanged. Nobody but you can access your ballot, and the clerks get two days to accurately count the votes. All that goes away if somebody claims to be you and suppresses your vote by taking your good name.

Please vote Yes on Question 1. Vot-

er ID and absentee ballot reforms together will secure Maine's elections.

Question 1 on Maine's November referendum ballot might seem like it's only about voter ID, but it's really about voter suppression.

Sure, one component includes more stringent ID requirements. But it also imposes significant barriers to voting that will impact hard-working, rural, aging, and disabled people the most.

For example, an elderly individual could not call their town clerk to request an absentee ballot by phone nor have a family member request one for them. Older and disabled people would be newly burdened by having to re-request an absentee ballot ahead of each election. Busy parents, rural residents, out-of-state students, and everyone working during voting hours would have fewer days to vote absentee.

Currently, 40 percent of Maine's population uses absentee ballots with representation across political parties - and the process is statistical-



Assistant coach Julia Parmakian said Windham looked really strong it was nice to see them pushing each



# Preparing your home for fall: essential checklist

Fall is the perfect time to get your home ready for colder weather. Taking care of small maintenance tasks now can save you cost-

keep your home safe, warm, and efficient all season long.

## 1. Clean Your Gutters

Clogged gutters can cause water damage to your roof, siding, and even your basement. They're also more prone to rust and corrosion when filled with debris.

- Clear out leaves and debris.
- Install mesh gutter guards to keep them clean longer.
- Ensure downspouts direct water at least 3 to 4 feet away from your foundation.

#### 2. Seal Up Air Leaks

Drafts drive up heating costs and make your home uncomfortable. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, sealing air leaks can save up to 20 percent on heating bills.

- Inspect and replace worn weatherstripping on doors and windows.
- Test with the "paper test" (close a door/window on a sheet of paper. If it slides easily, the seal is weak).
- Use a lit candle to detect drafts near frames (watch the flame flicker).
- Re-caulk gaps around windows, doors, and utility entry points.
- Consider upgrading to energy-efficient windows if drafts persist.



#### 3. Inspect Your Roof

Your roof is your home's first defense against the elements.

- Scan shingles for cracks, curling, or missing pieces.
- Check flashing around chimneys, vents, and valleys for damage.
- Look for excessive shingle granules in gutters (a sign of wear).
- Make sure gutters and downspouts are flowing freely.

#### 4. Protect Outdoor Faucets

Frozen pipes can burst and cause extensive damage.

- Shut off water to exterior faucets and drain the lines.
- Use styrofoam faucet covers if your faucets aren't freeze-proof.

#### 5. Give Your Furnace a Checkup Prevent breakdowns during the

coldest months.

- Schedule a professional inspection before winter.
- Replace the furnace filter (do this every 1 to 3 months in season).
- Listen for strange noises or uneven heating—signs that service may be needed sooner.

- Check the flue for cracks, blockages, or nests.

#### 7. Inspect Wood Stoves

Wood-burning stoves provide great warmth but require vigilance.

- Examine stovepipes for cracks, corrosion, or loose joints.
- Clean the stovepipe regularly during heating season.
- Inspect the stove body and legs for rust or cracks.

#### 8. Check Smoke and Carbon **Monoxide Detectors**

Fall is a great reminder to refresh these life-saving devices.

- Replace batteries and vacuum detectors with a soft brush.
- Test units using the test button or a smoke source (like a blown-out candle).- Install smoke detectors on every level of your home, including the basement.
- Ensure you have at least one CO detector near sleeping areas.

**Pro Tip:** Do a quick walk-around of your property as well - look for cracks in walkways, loose handrails, and overhanging branches that could break under heavy snow or ice.




