## Outpouring of community support at annual Veterans Day celebration

The Windham Veterans Center was practically standing room only as at least 200 people from the community were in attendance to support and pay their respects to those who served or are serving their country at the 2025 Veterans Day observance hosted by VFW Post 10643 on Tuesday, Nov. 11.

This event brought community members of all ages. The Windham Chamber Singers were there to continue their tradition of uniting the crowd in song and Boy Scouts of America Troop 805 were present to help out during this occasion that celebrated the men and women who fought for the freedom of the people of the United States of America.

VFW Post 10643 new Commander Jeffrey Cook was the master of ceremonies; former Post 10643 Commander Willie Goodman will be Cook's Senior Vice Commander. Goodman was presented with a certificate and a gift. The keynote speaker was Honor Flight Maine representative Elizabeth Cormier. The essay winners for the Patriot's Pen for

grades 6 to 8 and Voice of Democracy for grades 9 to 12 were also announced.

"Being the new commander means a lot to me," said Cook. "Mostly because what it means to the other veterans and the older veterans, having a younger guy come in ... being here to support them. I do a lot of things during the week and the month that they can't get out and do, and that's the most important. This is my first Veterans Day event and I didn't expect it to be this big. I didn't expect it to be this well attended by the community and other veterans; it really shows what we have in the community."

Windham senior and member of the Chamber Singers Rowan Cummings said the tradition and legacy of the group is to put the community first. Singing at the event every year is wholeheartedly an experience that means a lot to them. For her to see the community and veterans come together through their music is really

## Community comes together to support families in need during the holidays and beyond

As the holiday season approaches, the Windham and Raymond communities once again prove that generosity and compassion are at the heart of small-town life. From gift drives for children to care packages for older adults, local volunteers and organizations are working tirelessly to ensure that no family or individual goes without the warmth and joy of the upcoming season.

#### **Christmas Angels**

One of the most heartfelt examples of this spirit is the Christmas Angels program, which began at Windham Middle School (WMS) just five years ago with a few families helping four local households, seven children in total. What started as a small effort at the school because of a phone call asking if there was help for families in need, has grown into a town-wide movement that last year supported 32 families and 37 children.

"It began with just a few families asking if the schools could help," said organizer Debbie Hall, who coordinates the program through WMS. "Now we have over 100 'angels', people and neighborhoods all across town, who have stepped up to make sure local kids experience a joyful Christmas."

The Christmas Angels initiative works closely with the Windham Primary, Manchester, and the Windham High Schools to identify families who could use a little extra support. Each participating child provides a wish list of needs and wants, such as clothing, toys, and personal items. Vol-

unteers then coordinate donations so that each student receives at least two or three gifts, along with a new blanket for every child, a small but meaningful gesture that has become a tradition.

"This community amazes me every year," Hall said. "It has truly warmed my heart how many people want to help."

The group's work doesn't stop when the holidays end. Christmas Angels operates year-round, stepping in when families lose belongings to fires or other emergencies. "We've helped families throughout the year, not just at Christmas," Hall added. "That's what makes this community so special, the willingness to show up when it matters most."

# Giving back isn't just about charity

As our managing editor, Ed Pierce, has been called away to tend to a family emergency, I've been asked to fill in for this week's Insight. I must admit, stepping into Ed's shoes is a bit intimidating. His weekly reflections are rich with experience, journalistic grace, and heartfelt wisdom. I can only hope he'll be gentle with his critique when he returns. (Ed, if you're reading this...please, no red pen marks!)

It's that time of year again, the season when we hear phrases like "giving back," "helping those in need," and "the spirit of the holidays." They're lovely words, and they're true. But as I grow older and have gained more life experience, I've come to realize something deeper: giving back isn't just about charity. It's about building a supportive, thriving community where everyone has the opportunity to succeed and feel valued.

And if there's any place that embodies that idea, it's right here in Windham and Raymond.

When we hear the word charity, we often think of donations such as food drives, clothing bins, or fundraising campaigns. All of these are essential and make a difference. But charity, in the traditional sense, tends to be one-directional: someone gives, and someone receives. It's often a quick, compassionate response to an immediate need, a short-term fix for a problem that might resurface again and again.

Giving back, however, is more than that. It's about connection. It's about seeing yourself as part of a larger whole and recognizing that what strengthens one person strengthens us all. It's about relationships, understanding, and the belief that we each play a role in shaping the kind of community we want to live in.

When we give back, we're not doing it out of pity or obligation. We do it because we understand that everyone's well-being is intertwined. Helping others helps us, too. It reminds us of our shared humanity and restores our faith that good still exists in the world.

In my work in education, I wear many hats, and one of them includes coordinating Capstone Projects for high school seniors. Part of that work requires students to engage in meaningful community service, projects that require them to give of themselves.

At first, some students approach the requirement like it's just another box to check before graduation. But then something happens. They volunteer at an animal shelter, mentor at the other schools in the district, provide volunteer efforts with the community per community requests, or find a volunteer request that is meaningful in their lives. Slowly, they begin to understand as they write their second reflection paper what giving back really means. More often than not, some are surprised to find that they gain something too, a sense of purpose, connection, and belonging.

Recently, one student wrote in one of his ELO reflections about giving back. "When you help others, your brain can give out chemicals that can boost your mood and emotional well-being. Small acts can make a difference. This means that no matter how big or small the act can be, the impact can still be a huge difference. While helping others, you can connect to yourself in plenty ways, like finding something new about yourself through your actions." (Liam Moxey, Sophomore.)

I see examples of Windham and Raymond residents lifting each other up, while also lifting themselves. There are the volunteers who organize the Christmas Angels program, helping ensure local children have gifts and warm clothing during the holidays. There are those who quietly drop off groceries for a struggling neighbor or shovel an elderly friend's driveway after a storm. There are teachers who spend extra hours helping students succeed and business owners who sponsor youth sports or donate to local causes. And sometimes, those who were once in need come back to give, when their lives begin to shine brighter.

As we head into the holiday season, we'll hear many calls to give, to donate food, coats, toys, or money. And while all of that is important, I hope we also think about why we give. Do we continue that inspiration throughout the year?

Or, do we check a box, or to make ourselves feel good for a moment? Or do we give because we truly believe in the power of community, that each act of kindness, each hour of service, each dollar shared contributes to something larger than ourselves?

Giving back, at its heart, is not about charity, it's about being connected and community bonds. It's a way of saying, "We're in this together."

That's what makes this community so special. Windham and Raymond is a network of people who show up, for neighbors, for families, for students, for one



## Erik's Church Fall Golf Tournament raises funds for **RSU 14 Backpack Program; January Event Planned**

Community support for local families was on full display this fall when Erik's Church hosted its annual golf tournament, raising \$7,000 for the RSU 14 Backpack Program. This contribution builds on more than \$20,000 raised at a winter event earlier this year and reinforces the restaurant and entertainment venue's growing role as a committed partner in supporting students and nonprofit organizations locally.

The RSU 14 Backpack Program began during the 2011-2012 school year to address gaps in food availability for students over weekends and school breaks. While meals are available during the school day, many children leave school on Friday with uncertain access to nutritious food until they return on Monday. The program discreetly provides weekend food bags filled with kid-friendly, shelf-stable items that students can prepare independently. Bags are packed weekly by volunteers at Windham Middle School and distributed by school personnel to maintain privacy. The program was launched serving about 50

children and now supports more than 150 students districtwide, reflecting increased need as many families face rising food and grocery costs.

Each bag costs roughly \$10 to assemble, and while that seems modest, the program estimates that supporting one student for the full school year can cost around \$300. It is filled

with kid-friendly, nutritious foods that are lightweight enough to carry home in their backpacks. Because the Backpack Program does not receive funding through the district budget, it depends entirely on contributions from individuals, community groups, and area businesses. Volunteers, rather than paid staff, handle all planning,

purchasing, and packing, ensuring that donations are spent directly on food for students. Organizers say this makes the program particularly impactful, because every contribution goes directly toward providing consistent nourishment to local children.

Erik's Church owner Kenny Cianchette said he supports the Backpack Program because it meets a visible need and does so with remarkable efficiency. He noted that the all-volunteer structure allows the program to serve children without administrative costs typically associated with nonprofit organizations. "I support the Backpack Program because the need for the program is, unfortunately, there and the dollars given to the team who run it are 100% used for the purpose," Cianchette said. "There is no waste by the organization since it is volunteer-run and financially backed by contributions. Many organizations have overhead to make their missions a reality, but this program is entirely operated professionally, based on my experience, by amazing volunteers."

Cianchette added that the ability to organize events that bring the com-

"There's no performance that we feel more honored to be a part of," said Dr. Nickerson. "And in my final time here, I want to thank you for allowing us not just to preform, but to be present in this ceremony. It means a great deal to us to be here."

Keynote speaker Cormier said all veterans should apply to take their Honor Flight trip. No matter how big or little their service, all veterans are worthy of it. For Cormier, each trip reminds us gratitude should never have an expiration date. It's a journey that truly touches hearts. VFW Post 10643 later presented Cormier with a donation of \$1,000 to Honor Flight Maine.

The theme for both essays this year was 'how are you showing patriotism

and support of your country?' The Patriot's Pen winner was Windham Christian Academy eighth grader Elsa Pearson; second place was Annaelle Kawaya. The Voices of Democracy winner was Windham sophomore Shea Carey.

Pearson spoke of the importance of volunteering and how when she was in fifth and sixth grade, she volunteered at the local food pantry setting up Thanksgiving baskets. She said helping our community is one step closer to making our country better. She and her class have also traveled across southern Maine to perform juggling acts for nursing homes and spread the gospel, while visiting with the residents of these homes.

Carey's essay was about the many ways to display patriotism. Whether that be standing to attention during the pledge of allegiance or stand-

ing up for those who can't stand for themselves. Carey said each action she makes is done with intention, passion and regard for others. Her version of patriotism involves the simplest acts of kindness and integrity. She values being a kind person and hopes those who heard her essay take those words and strive to make a difference where they can.

"My whole family, father, grandfather, great-grandfather were all veterans, and I totally support what they do," said Windham resident Tom Tyler. "I think the turnout here is absolutely awesome for the patriotism of this country."

97-year-old Jerry Black was the oldest veteran at the observance. Black served in the Navy during the Korean War.

"It means more to me (to see everyone here) because my cousin, a military man is not with me," said Black. "Whenever I can come to something I try to represent him as well as myself. Just to be here and be active with all these people and the young people; I want to be here. The town has been good to me, and I hope I can be good to them sometime."

Black described his cousin like a brother; they grew up together and he is proud to represent him at these events. At 97, Black said he'd like to make it to 100 but takes it day-by-day. He feels good, he still drives, he walks and emphasized it's important to keep moving. He enjoys coming to the Windham Veterans Center to just have a cup of coffee with the guys.

"Probably someone here either is a veteran, knows a veteran or has a veteran in their family. Today we honor every veteran," said Cook. "Let us also remember the families and the loved ones of those who still carry the burden of the true cost of freedom." <

## **End-of-life options to be discussed at Windham Library**

The Windham Public Library will be hosting a discussion of end-of-life options for residents from 6 p.m. - 8 p.m. on Friday, November 14.

Allison Osgood, Hospice Liaison with Beacon Hospice, will provide more details about hospice care and how it can help patients live out their lives comfortably, and Bob McCown, a volunteer with Maine Death with Dignity, will present information about Maine's Death with Dignity law and how terminally ill Mainers can choose to end their lives through aid in dying medicine.

The hospice program overall is misunderstood, Osgood said, adding that many patients don't take advantage until their illnesses are advanced, to where they're no longer able to enjoy the time they have left with their families and loved ones.

"I want to change the stigma around hospice care," she noted, saying that many people do not think to take advantage of the six months of benefits that are available to patients. "We can keep you home where you can do what really matters to you."

A patient is eligible for hospice care once they receive an order from their doctor that states if their disease follows the normal course, the person will likely pass away in 6 months or less. Once the hospice provider completes an evaluation to ensure the patient meets the Medicare guidelines, a team of people are engaged to provide care for the patient and their families.

A nurse and aide will each separately visit the home several times a week to check on the patient's wellbeing, ensuring their comfort.

"One patient just wanted to play cribbage with their aide, so they set a date every week," Osgood said. "It made his day. He looked forward to it every single week."

Hospice also helps beyond just patient care, as being a caregiver and managing a patient's medical care can be difficult and overwhelming. The team from hospice can help alleviate those worries and concerns to allow families and friends to enjoy whatever time they have left with their loved ones.

"We're there to walk you through the process so we can tell you what is happening and what to expect and be that communication liaison between the families and doctors, so everyone is on the same page" Osgood said. "Sometimes we get these families on, and you can just see the wave of pure calm come over them. We're taking those little things away so that they can be family members instead of just caregivers."

Hospice does not preclude a patient from seeking aid in dying medicine. Frequently, patients are on hospice at the time they choose to take the medication, and the hospice care team can be present to help at the end, as they would for an unexpected death. While the hospice personnel cannot be present in the home when the patient is taking the medication, after it's taken, they will provide the patient

with any care they need in their final moments.

"As soon as meds are taken, they can go in and provide support, including to the family sitting vigil and make sure that the patient is comfortable while waiting for the medication to take effect," Osgood explained. "It's incredible. I think it gives a sense of control back to these people."

"When you're losing your independence, going through serious illness, you lose a part of yourself, so having that option of Death with Dignity gives them a measure of control," she added.

Aid in dying medicine is "an


emerging field of palliative medicine," noted Reverend Valerie Lovelace, Executive Director of Maine Death with Dignity, a nonprofit organization that provides services, education and advocacy for patients. "It's just one more tool in the end-of-life toolbox for patients and physicians, if those patients are seeking that kind of support."

Lovelace explained that in Oregon, one of the states with the oldest aid in dying laws, 90% of patients were on hospice at the time they chose to take the medications. Patients find comfort in having the medication and

having a sense of control when their disease has dramatically reduced the control patients have over their lives.

"Not everyone dies well. There's this idea out there that end-of-life care is sufficient and that it meets everyone's needs. And the truth is, it doesn't," she said. "You only have to work in hospice for a short time to see the other side of things. And so, this meets the needs of people who want to have some control, some say in how long it takes for them to die. There are some patients who say it is palliative just having it. Even if they don't use it,

She added that "a number of patients here in Maine have felt so relieved once they are through the qualification process and they know they can use the medication if they need it. It brings so much relief."

Maine's Death with Dignity Act was adopted into law in 2019. It allows terminally ill patients, in conjunction with their physician and a consulting physician, to request medication that would end their life. There are considerations and requirements in the Act, ensuring that patients are appropriately screened so that the decision is being made while the patient is of sound mind and capable of considering the grave consequences.

To qualify for the medication, terminally ill patients whose condition will likely be fatal within six months must make two oral requests to their physician for the life-ending medication, separated by a 15-day waiting period, during which the patient must also submit a separate written request, appropriately witnessed by two others. Some patients may be required to undergo psychological examination as well, to ensure their competence and ability to make a rational decision.

The Maine Death with Dignity Act Statistical Report, an annual report required by the law, reported that while 66 state residents applied to the program in 2024, 48 of those residents died by "patient choice". Thirteen of the applicants passed away due to their illness before receiving the medications. Applicants represented all 14 Maine counties and were aged from 53 years old to 101 years old. Most of the applications were from patients diagnosed with cancer, while others suffered from ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease), heart disease, and COPD.

About Maine Death With Dignity: Founded in January 2014, It's My Death (IMD) is a 501(c)(3) with the mission of breaking societal taboos and stigma around death and dying to support people having sincere, detailed, honest discussions regarding every aspect of their end of life wishes and care. Do it before you need to. Revisit the topic often. After all, talking about death is not the thing that's going to kill you. IMD educates in Maine on assisted dying laws (how they work and who they are for) and other end-of-life topics.

It's My Death completed a name transition to [doing-business-as] Maine Death with Dignity in September 2019. A major part of the programming is providing fact-based information regarding death with dignity laws, or medical aid in dying, and Maine's law. The goal as Maine Death with Dignity is to continue the mission of engaging the public to increase awareness of any topic related to death and dying, including using the words "death" and "dying" and avoiding euphemisms like "passed" or "passing."

As Mary got older, Youbell then went to work for New Balance in Norridgewock, ME as plant manager in the cut and sew division. Here she met many people, travelled around the U.S., and created a lot of patterns for New Balance. When she decided to move back to Windham, she opened Youbell's Sewing Shoppe along with her daughter, Dian. They sewed, repaired, and manufactured items for individuals, regional police departments, and companies like L.L. Bean and Levinsky's.



more than 170 countries and geographical areas to seek out and help the needy in their own communities, their country, and the world.



## WHS student wins pie contest at Fryeburg Fair

It is now officially sweater weather, which means that it is also officially pie season, and Windham High School (WHS) sophomore student Ava Blanchard took pie season very seriously this year. The Katahdin Program at WHS, which Blanchard is a part of, has been participating in pie contests at the Fryeburg Fair, and this year, Blanchard entered and won the junior division of the Two crusted Apple Pie contest.

Blanchard is part of Christine Fredette's class, who is the STEM teacher at the Katahdin Program, as well as the WHS Alpine Coach and WHS cooking club co-advisor. The Katahdin Program provides alternative education programming for students grades 9-12 enrolled in the RSU14 school district. It is a small, community-focused school dedicated to addressing the social emotional and academic needs of all students, integrating outdoor adventures, service-learning, and restorative practices to meet the social, emotional, and academic needs of students. The program is designed to help students build critical thinking skills and a sense of community by customizing their path to graduation.

"Years ago, we helped students enter the Whoopie Pie contest at the Fryeburg fair and won a few times," says Fredette. "The apple pie contest is the one the students chose to do this year."

Fredette says that having students bake pies not only teaches them a new skill, but also gives them a chance to risk entering the Fryeburg fair contest.

"I do not know any other teenagers who would take a risk and try to win," she says. "By giving them the resources and time to do this at school, it lowers the risks, but the benefits are still great!"

In preparation for the pie contest, students baked for the two weeks leading up to the fair.

"The students had to find a pie recipe and write it out to submit it with their pie," says Fredette. "We arrived at the fair and brought our pies to the exhibition center and entered them into the Two Crusted Apple Pie contest. Judging started at 1 PM, results were in by 2PM, and Ava had her blue ribbon by 2:30PM.

The pies were judged on appearance, taste, and ease of preparation (recipe write up). The Katahdin program entered five pies in the junior division. For several students, this was their first time baking an apple pie.

WHS sophomore Ava Blanchard comes from a very big line of bakers and cooks in her family.

"I thought to myself that I would not get this opportunity again, and I have never made an apple pie before, so I thought I would just go for it," says Blanchard. "We were working and talking about pie making for about two weeks before the contest and I decided that I wanted to make a test pie myself a couple days before the fair."

Out of about 20 other pies that competed in the Two Crusted Apple Pie contest, the pie that Blanchard made was the winner.

"I was very shocked and mind blown," said Blanchard. "I was not at all expecting to win; I was really just competing for the fun of it."

As a prize, Blanchard received \$75

and a Blue Ribbon.

The Katahdin program is now baking pies for an Age Friendly Event that will happen on November 17th at Windham Town Hall, where Age Friendly Windham and Windham Parks and Recreation will be holding a Thanksgiving Community meal for residents 55+. <

munity together is the most effective way Erik's Church can contribute. and delivery. The quiet reliability of the program means students facing food insecurity over the weekend and during school breaks can receive support without feeling singled out.



# Windham High School student shares story of adversity to resilience on the TEDx Talk stage

Being invited to speak at a TEDx Talk is a rare honor, especially at just 17 years old. For Windham High School (WHS) senior Kendra Eubanks, that honor became reality on Saturday afternoon, November 8 at the TEDxDirigo event on the UNE Portland campus, speaking openly about overcoming adversity, embracing resilience, and discovering the strength that comes from self-advocacy and community.

Eubanks' story began at a Portland middle school, when bullying left her anxious and isolated. "As a biracial person from white and black backgrounds, I wasn't Black enough for the Black students," she told the audience. "Their resentment grew into intimidation." The harassment became so severe that school administrators asked her to eat lunch in the teachers' lounge for her safety, away from peers in the cafeteria.

Although the bullying often left her in tears, Eubanks still considered the Portland middle school her community. She had attended there since kindergarten, surrounded by familiar teachers and classmates. But one afternoon, everything changed.

"I was in woodshop class when I got called to the principal's office," she said. "That wasn't unusual be-

cause I was often called to the office regarding the harassment, but when they told me to bring all my belongings, my heart started racing. When I walked in, not only was the principal there, but my parents were too."

The principal explained that the

school could no longer protect her and it was recommended that she attend another school. Fearing for their child's safety, her parents agreed and removed Kendra from the school.



new environment, Eubanks, who felt discouraged that she didn't get a choice to stay at the Portland school, wanted her voice to be part of the next decision. "I wanted to advocate for myself," she said. Since one of her parents lived in Windham, she chose Windham Middle School.

At first, adjusting wasn't easy. "I wasn't white enough for the white community," she said. But unlike her previous experience, her "Blackness was appreciated". She found support from teachers, administrators and a growing sense of belonging among other students of color.

This acceptance boosted her confidence to become more involved. During her freshman year at WHS, Eubanks co-founded the Black Student Union (BSU), which has since grown into a space for students of color to share experiences, build connections, and foster inclusivity.


Her leadership has expanded beyond BSU, by joining the JMG (Jobs for Maine Graduates) Leadership Team and participating in volleyball and track and field. As Eubanks' passion for change grew, she was inspired to speak at the annual New England Youth Identity Summit, hosted by Waynflete in Portland. At last year's summit, during her second appearance, a TEDxDirigo organizer who attended her session was moved by her story and invited her to bring her message to a larger audience.

Eubanks accepted this opportunity because she wanted people to hear her story. "I don't want people to feel bad for me but to see how I overcame

my challenges and how much good came out of everything."

WHS staff were not surprised by her invitation to speak.

estly, I wasn't all too surprised. Kendra has an effervescent personality combined with an earnest passion for justice and equity. 





"I have volunteered at the food pantry for years. A few years ago I started Christmas bags for the seniors. It's so sad to see so many of them in need. It broke my heart, thus senior bags began," said McPhail. "Various com-

panies will donate the bags with their logo on it, and we also get monetary donations from companies and individuals. With the money we shop for the 10 most requested items. A survey goes out a couple weeks before to see their needs. They are so grateful."

Last year, volunteers prepared and distributed bags for 67 seniors. This year, that number has grown significantly, with 91 seniors already signed up to receive a bit of holiday cheer.

"When seniors apply for the bags through the food pantry, they fill out a short wish list," Oldakowski explained. "We then collect donations from businesses and community members and purchase whatever is left with donated funds."

The most requested items are simple but deeply appreciated, such as warm hats, gloves, mittens, socks, dish soap, tissues, toilet paper, blankets, and even decks of playing cards. Gift cards are also welcome, providing flexibility for seniors to purchase groceries or other essentials.

Donations will be accepted anytime at Fielding's Oil located at 639 Roosevelt Trail in Windham through December 1, and volunteers will gather at Pat's Pizza in Windham, which donates space each year, to fill the bags before handing them out at the food pantry on December 17.

### It Takes a Village 207 Christmas

Another organization is making an impact and that is It Takes A Village 207 with their Christmas Program. Based in nearby Limington, they serve families across York and Cumberland Counties, including Windham.

Founded in 2020 by Becky Jackson and her mother Journey. This family-led effort began during the pandemic when Journey saw neighbors struggling to put food on the table. What started small by just them in their home has grown into a well-known regional program that connects donors with local children and families through a sponsorship model.

Individuals, families, and businesses can 'adopt' a child or household and purchase items directly from personalized wish lists. "We make tags for each child that list their specific needs and wants," Becky Jackson shared. "People can pick a tag from a local business, buy the gift, and drop it off unwrapped."

They also accept donations of new, unwrapped toys that are not specific to a child. Every little bit helps to give area children and teens an unforgettable Christmas morning. Drop-off trees and boxes are already up at Cormier's Dog House, Fire & Ice Maine, Hailey's Kitchen, Paul's Boutique of Maine, Better Fit Fitness Center, The Kitchen in Limington, and The Windham Eagle office. Donations are accepted until December 13, with all gifts distributed locally.

"It's amazing to see how our community pulls together," Jackson said. "Even a small gift can mean the world to a child who might not have much to look forward to this time of year."

For those wishing to participate or host a donation tree, the easiest way to connect is through the group's Facebook page, It Takes a Village 207. The organization is still in need of sponsorships. The need this year is greater than ever and they are hoping to not have to turn anyone away. They post wish lists on their Facebook page to help navigate the most requested items and to help buy for specific kids. It doesn't matter if people prefer to sponsor a child directly, grab a tag off a giving tree, or simply shop for various items to donate to the boxes around town, it all adds up into giving children a magical Christmas.

Windham's compassion doesn't fade once the decorations come down. Throughout the year, area churches offer free community meals every Thursday from 5 to 6 p.m., welcoming anyone in need of a hot meal and friendly conversation. For more information, contact one of the following churches: St. Ann's Episcopal Church, Windham Hill United Church of Christ, and Faith Lutheran Church - all of Windham.

In a world that often feels fastpaced and divided, community spirit stands as a reminder of what truly matters. Whether it's a middle schooler picking out a gift for another child, a volunteer wrapping a blanket for a senior, or a business hanging donation tags on a tree, each act of generosity reflects the same shared belief: that no one should feel forgotten during the holidays.

As one volunteer put it best, "The success stories are what keep us going, especially from those who have received from our efforts and have given back to the community when life brought a brighter future for them. Every time we hear from a family or see the joy in a child's eyes, we're reminded that kindness still shines bright in our communities." <

## Youth Cheerleading program ends season with showcase

Windham Youth Cheerleading program has been a sideline program for kindergarten through eighth grade for the last 10 years. They cheer for the Windham Youth Football program from flag to tackle. The 10-week program has grown exponentially over the last three years, totaling over 100 athletes. At the end of the WYC season, the teams put on a showcase to highlight all their hard work. The showcase is not scored and is about providing encouragement, celebration and having fun.

"I think that our program has grown so much in the last several years because there has never been a robust sideline cheering program for young athletes," said assistant sixth grade to eighth grade coach Stacy Davis. "In years past, some athletes were only exposed to cheer once they entered high school. Many believe that they need to commit to competition cheer ... our program allows for a different form of cheer that may suit other families. We also try very hard to make this program financially accessible. We have the ability to provide financial scholarship to athletes should this be needed, as we never want the financial burden to affect participation."

The program is considered a feeder program for the high school, so the job of coaches at WYC is to make sure the girls are aware of any new cheers the high school is using. WYC works closely with the high school cheering squad that serves as a role model to

the younger group. The coaches start the younger groups out with the basics and progress up to more complex skills for the older kids.

This year's showcase featured five teams, all grouped by grade, and they show friends and family their routines which include cheers, jumps, stunts and tumbling.

Participants of WYC begin cheering on the field in kindergarten. It's fun for individuals to cheer on friends and classmates.

Eighth grader Rosie Dumont has been participating in WYC since she was in first grade. She was a dancer and loved uniforms, pompoms and the sass of cheerleading. She always loved being on stage, doing routines.

"Having great coaches that push me to try things that are hard for me or that I don't have confidence in yet (have made me a better cheerleader)," said Dumont. "This program builds strength and confidence and gives you happiness after you complete a routine. It teaches you that you have to work hard to achieve your goals; cheering is a very competitive and difficult sport. Having good teammates and coaches makes a huge difference. If an athlete wants to do cheerleading, they should because it's a rewarding sport."

Dumont loves participating in the showcase every year. She said it went really well this year. Her stunt groups hit every stunt nicely. Dumont said performing in the showcase is awesome because you see all of the different age levels perform, and you get to reflect on your own progress. Dumont plans to cheer in high school

and wants to see how far her potential can go.

Third grader Bristol Grondin started cheerleading through WYC when she was in kindergarten but took a couple years off because she felt she wasn't ready. She really wanted to join WYC because she saw her sister, who is also involved in the program in a cheer competition last year; seeing her sister in the competition made Grondin want to join back up and be just like one of them.

"I was happy with what we did," said Grondin about this year's showcase. "I think my team did an awesome job cheering for the other teams and showcase. I was excited to see how good we did. I also enjoyed to see all our families there to cheer us on. My favorite thing about Windham Youth Cheerleading is I really like the stunts, dances, and I like to show off what I have learned. here and there.

"He's been great, and it's been huge for the kids having someone that they know and can look up to," said Maine Evolution under-14 head coach Dave Grant, who used to coach Fothergill in the under-18 league. "Bobby hops right in the drills with them, skates with them, competes with them hard. It's great to have him because he's obviously got knowledge from a player's perspective, but it's awesome for the kids to have him around the bench. It's a coach's dream to have a kid that you coached ... to now be on the bench with you. It's one of the better things that I've experienced; it's a highlight to see the next generation of coaches coming up."

Grant said Fothergill is still a very good player and challenges his play-

ers; he was where they were five or six years ago. Fothergill brings great energy to the practices, and he can tell he is having fun.

In addition to coaching, every season the team teaches kids how to skate, and Fothergill attends those to encourage them by teaching the basics of the game.

"He's taught me where I need to be in my certain position and what I need to be to stop the puck from entering the zone," said Maine Evolution Windham freshman Cooper Fournelle. "He's good as a coach, I feel like I've improved and we've chatted a couple times about what I should do with the puck. Overall, I think he's helped me a lot."

When Fothergill reflects on his athletic career, hockey has played a major

part in teaching him how to become a leader and a better all-around person. He's been able to use the knowledge given to him throughout his time as a player to teach others what it takes to become not only a good hockey player but a good person.

When playing for the Trail Blazers he learned to work hard, have fun and not to let anyone push you out of the saddle. The team also taught him how to strive to maximize his potential on and off the ice.

His advice for any current players who want to consider coaching after high school is opportunities come from so many places that there is no right or wrong choice. Being involved in sports at any age brings community and togetherness as well as being a great place to learn, teach and have fun. <



through the National Flood Insurance Program or private insurers.

2. Increased Risk of Wind and Storm Damage

Stronger storms bring higher winds that can damage roofs, siding, windows, and trees on your property. Homeowners may see higher rates or stricter policy terms if their property is in an area prone to wind damage.

3. Winter Weather and Freeze-Related Claims

More variable winter conditions such as rapid temperature fluctuations and heavier snow loads-contribute to an uptick in claims for frozen or burst pipes, ice dam damage, and roof collapses.
