Local dancers prepare for spectacular fairytale inspired holiday performance

A group of fairytale characters will need to hurry to save Christmas in a new holiday dance production, Christmas at the Castle, premiering on Saturday, Dec. 20.

The new 90-minute show will have a single performance at 4 p.m. at the Donald M. Gay Performing Arts Center, located at Edward Little High School, 77 Harris Street, in Auburn.

Dancers of all ages from the Maine Dance Company and the Maine Dance Center, located on Roosevelt Trail in Raymond, will take the stage to help the Sugar Plum Fairy retrieve her lost wand to ensure Christmas magic will carry Santa Claus across the globe.

"If Sugarplum Fairy doesn't have her wand, Christmas is in jeopardy," said Adrienne Pelletier, one of the two authors of the show's storyline, when detailing the adventures the cast will

summoned back to the North Pole. A group of friends then journey through various realms, including the Candy Cane Woods and the Chocolate Falls, to reach the North Pole and retrieve the wand, allowing Sugar Plum Fairy to empower Santa's sleigh and host of reindeer with magic for their Christmas Eve journey. On the journey, the

group will encounter familiar characters, including Rapunzel, Belle and Ariel, along with another unnamed princess who controls the winter winds.

Pelletier, along with her sister and co-author, Rhiannon Pelletier-Guerrette, worked to develop the show for almost two years, after a performance at Windham's Summerfest in 2023.

"It was the first time we had combined play acting with the dance industry that we were already a part of, and that kind of stuck the idea," said Pelletier-Guerrette. "We said 'hey, we've got this show what if we turned it into a holiday thing?"

Moody Foundation to honor beloved resident during WHS boys' basketball home opener

More than one year after his passing, the memory and character of Windham resident Pat Moody remain within not just the local community but throughout Southern Maine.

The Pat Moody Foundation was launched to keep Moody's memory and love for helping the community alive. The purpose of the Pat Moody Foundation is to provide opportunities to others in need, whether that be through scholarships or money for athletics, and hopefully encourage them to help others and in turn become more civic-minded.

During the Windham High School varsity boys' basketball team home opener against Sanford High on at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 9, "Pat Moody Night" will pay tribute to a genuine community hero and legend.

"Pat was truly a pillar here," said wife Sherma Moody. "His passion for basketball and his belief in giving kids a chance to grow through the sport shaped so much of who he was. Pat always made it a point to include as many kids as possible, teaching them the fundamentals of basketball but also the value of teamwork, perseverance, and belonging."

The goal of the Pat Moody Foundation is to put the funds raised right

back into the community and into forming positive influences and experiences for youth. It currently aims to expand scholarship offerings for more students in the coming year and continue fundraising events for kids in need, including educational support and extracurricular activities.

"Not a day passes that I don't think of Pat. Over the weekend, I noticed a social media post that sought comments about foods that were popular at dinner tables in the 1950s and 1960s but are greatly unknown these days.

It made me think about my own family and upbringing and meals or items we would consume then as compared to now. My mother did not work or drive when I was growing up and she took immense pride in planning and cooking family meals for each day of the week.

She was constantly looking for new ways to improve and add to her meal planning and once she sent for a box filled with handy new dinner recipes from a mail-order company in Pennsylvania. One of those mail-order recipes was for something called "Porcupine Balls." It was a kind of meatball rolled in white rice and baked.

Another of her culinary specialties was Hungarian goulash, a mix of tomato sauce, macaroni and hamburger. She served it at least once a week and I eventually came to loathe that meal when I arrived home from school and observed her preparing it on the kitchen stove.

My father's contributions to our meals were usually canned fruit side dishes that were consumed after the entrée dish.

Some of his favorites as I can recall were small bowls of purple plums or mandarin oranges, each doused with a hearty helping of heavy syrup from the cans they came from.

If I balked at consuming the plums, I can still hear my mother proclaiming, "Just eat them, they will keep you regular young man." I did enjoy plums, but I never liked piling up plum pits on my plate afterward.

When I asked my father if mandarin oranges were grown in Florida, he told me that he had a friend in high school who once received a box of them as a Christmas present that had been shipped to America from Japan. With his answer, I wondered if instead they should be called Japanese oranges and he told me that was a "ridiculous" proposition.

Other meals or food items my mother served us in the past that I'm glad seem to have disappeared include Campbell's Green Pea Soup, tuna noodle casserole and Jello shaped in molds containing celery or onions. Sometimes her Jello molds would have fruit cocktail in them, but mostly she stuck to onions or celery, and I

Green Pea Soup didn't taste bad, but I had to hold my nose to avoid the smell while eating it. Its odor resembled soiled diapers to me.

Try as I might, the dry, mushy disgusting lump on my dinner plate as a 7-yearold called tuna noodle casserole always turned my stomach. No matter what my mother would add to it including lemon juice, extra mayonnaise or bacon bits, it still tasted worse than cat food. To my surprise, during my basic training in the U.S. Air Force years later, the dining hall served its own version of tuna noodle casserole, and it was the only menu option that night.

Some other foods that would come home from the grocery store in my parents' shopping cart would be limburger cheese, liverwurst, canned creamed corn, marshmallow fluff, and sardines.

My father once showed me how he would make a sardine sandwich, but I never could get past looking at the fish heads before taking them out of the can to put them a slice of bread and take a bite.

When my mother would ask if I wanted a "Fluffernutter" for lunch, I would always pass on that too. It was a peanut butter and jelly sandwich with marshmallow fluff spread on it. Back then I wasn't much of a fan of peanut butter and would ask for just a jelly sandwich.

Limburger cheese and liverwurst never really appealed to me as a child. Like Green Pea Soup, it was hard to get past the smell of limburger cheese. No matter how often my mother would try to encourage me to eat liverwurst, which is a kind of spreadable sausage, I never could get past the taste or its aroma. She would put in on saltine crackers or on bread and it was utterly revolting to me.

If I saw her reach for a can of creamed corn from the cupboard to heat up for dinner, it would produce instant upset stomach symptoms in me. To this very day, the sight or smell of creamed corn gives me the chills mentally and makes me want to vomit physically.

I'm sure my mother felt the same way about foods I enjoyed too. Once she visited my home and was surprised to see my wife was fixing some Chinese food on the stove in a wok that we had been given as a wedding present. She told me that ever since she was a small girl, the sight of Chinese food made her ill and she couldn't eat the meal we were preparing.

All this reminds me of how Mark Twain described food aversion.

"The only way to keep your health is to eat what you don't want, drink what you don't like, and do what you'd rather not," he said. <

Surveys gauge Windham's views on climate, transportation

During December, two different public surveys will gauge public opinion in Windham about topics affecting the community's plans for the future.

On Wednesday, Dec. 3, a public meeting at Windham Town Hall asked residents to provide feedback to help the town improve existing connections, create new connections, and make walking and biking easier, safer, and more enjoyable. The meeting aimed to enhance Windham's Active Transportation Plan as addressed on the 2016 Comprehensive Plan update.

Community feedback will help shape the future of walking and biking infrastructure in the town, including planning for new sidewalks and bike lanes for people traveling on foot or on wheels. Meeting and survey input will guide improvements to existing sidewalks and roads, help identify new opportunities, and make walking and biking in Windham easier and safer.

An online public survey will be available at the end of this week on the town website and will augment the public meeting and was created with funding support from the Portland Area Comprehensive Transportation System, which is the metropolitan planning organization for the Greater Portland region). The Town of Windham is working with the Greater Portland Council of Governments (GPCOG) and Sebago Technics to develop a plan to evaluate, analyze and make improvements to the Town's active transportation infrastructure such as sidewalks, bikeways, and multi-use trails.

The meeting and survey will result in the development of a town-wide Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan going forward. The transportation survey ends Dec. 24.

Mary Wicklund, Town of Windham Environmental and Sustainability Coordinator, says that the town is also working closely with the Greater Portland Council of Governments on a climate impact survey, with GPCOG taking the lead on the survey and analyzing the results.

"In the State of Maine, much of the vulnerability and impacts resulting from the changing climate impacts has focused on the coastal regions," Wicklund said. "This project, a collaboration between GPCOG and five municipalities, aims to better understand the climate risks for inland communities. For example, extreme heat and impacts from larger storms (resulting in road washouts and reduced water quality),

impact residents across the state.

Wicklund said working with GP-COG will support the town in identifying and prioritizing the next steps to address current needs to enhance our infrastructure, emergency preparedness, and overall community wellbeing.

According to Emma Morgan, Sustainability Program Associate for the GPCOG climate impact is a key issue in future planning for Windham.

"Climate-related impacts, such as more frequent and intense storms, increased flooding, heat waves, and shifting seasonal weather patterns, are becoming more noticeable each year in the region," she said. "In Windham, these changes are affecting road conditions, public safety, household energy costs, and the town's natural resources. Understanding how these changes are affecting the community and its resources is essential to preparing for risks, protecting property and infrastructure, and supporting vulnerable residents."

Morgan said the climate impact survey is designed to engage with the community and gather first-hand information on how community members are experiencing climate-related changes.

"We hope to learn which impacts

people are most concerned about, where residents may already be seeing impacts such as flooding, erosion, heat-related challenges, or storm damage, and how prepared households feel today and what barriers exist to improving resilience," Morgan said.


She said the survey results will help to inform the town's climate adaptation and resilience planning.

"They will help to identify priority areas for investment, guide decision making, and shape preparedness strategies," Morgan said. "The data collected will also highlight where additional outreach or support may be needed. Ultimately, the feedback from the community will help ensure that future planning efforts reflect community needs and that town resources are utilized to make the greatest impact."

The climate survey will remain open through Dec. 31.

"Once it closes, we will compile and analyze all responses, and the findings will be shared publicly in the final Vulnerability Assessment Report," Morgan said. "This report, developed through the Community Resilience Partnership Service Provider Grant, will be published no later than July 2026."

cover the joy and confidence that come from playing the sport he cherished.



APEX teacher helps Windham High School students reclaim their path through alternative learning

Some call it a calling. For Windham High School teacher Adrianne Shetenhelm, hers began in elementary school, when she proudly told her class she wanted to be a teacher while answering the age-old question, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" Even a joking warning from her teacher – "There's no money in it" - couldn't shake a dream she felt to her core.

"To me, school was and is my happy place," she said. "Studying something new, learning from mistakes, and growing is the purpose in life. Now I see that helping others on that path is my purpose."

Today, she serves as the lead educator behind Windham High School's APEX program (Alternative Programming for Excellence), a support system for students whose education has been disrupted, who need flexibility in earning credits, or who require a different pathway to graduation. For her, the work is far more than instruction; it's about helping students reconnect to hope, responsibility, and possibility.

"When I started teaching English, I was eager to share my love of literature," she said. "Through the students' writing, I saw the complex lives my students lived. When some disappeared - due to homelessness, transfers, or mental health struggles - I felt

powerless to help."

Her move to APEX changed that. "Here, students can resume classes after a break in education, or a move from a new school, or earn the credits they need to graduate in a small learning community. My job has shifted from solely teaching literature, to helping after high school."

scribes her job as "having one foot in the traditional classroom and one foot in alternative education," she said. "We support students earning credits or those needing a home base in a large high school. I truly have the best students—talented, unique, and inspiring me every day."

She also recognized that many educators supporting nontraditional student pathways weren't connected under a formal department. In response, she proposed creating a new "Alternative Pathways" department, which she now chairs.

"I wanted those teachers to have a

"People sometimes think alternative education is a last resort, but it's not. It's a course correction. It's a chance to realign and take control of their learning with support."

She wishes more people understood the resilience her students demonstrate every day.

"These are young people who want to succeed. They just need the right environment to do it."

Her educational journey reflects her



Windham Town Council finalizes committee appointments

With the full contingent of newly elected members taking their seats on the Windham Town Council, committee assignments were determined during the council's Nov. 25 meeting.

Three councilors, David Nadeau, Bill Reiner and Katie Cook, were appointed to serve on the town's Finance Committee. Nadeau and Cook are At-Large council members while Reiner represents Windham's West District.

To serve on the town's Appointments Committee, the council elected councilors Mark Morrison, Maggie Terry and Katie Cook. Terry represents Windham's North District while Morrison is an At-Large town councilor.

Councilors Brett Jones (Windham East District), Bill Reiner and David Nadeau were elected to serve on the Windham Ordinance Committee.

Two new council representatives were elected to serve on the Windham Economic Development Corporation

Board of Directors. They are Maggie Terry (North District) and Doug Fortier (South District).

The Windham Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee council representative will be Brett Jones (East District).

The council elected At-Large town councilors Katie Cook and Mark Morrison to serve on the Substance Prevention Grant Committee.

Following a brief discussion, councilors deferred making an appointment for the Windham Natural Resources Advisory Committee. Town Manager Bob Burns said the committee typically deals with issues such as town building energy efficiency and solar panel use but suggested that the council may want to eliminate this committee and place oversight elsewhere during a future meeting.

For the Highland Lake Leadership Team, councilors appointed David Nadeau (At-Large) as the council representative for this group.

Councilor Mark Morrison (At-Large) was elected as the Town of Windham's delegate to the Greater Portland Council of Governments General Assembly, which is the policy making body of GPCOG. Councilor Bill Reiner (West District) will serve as the town's alternate delegate.

The council appointed Windham Town Manager Bob Burns as representative to the ecomaine Board of Directors with Councilor David Nadeau to serve as alternate town representative for that organization.







Last year, Sawyer said more than 200 people submitted votes and about 12 houses in town participated.

Sawyer said she wanted to create a fun, free, and family-friendly event that the whole community could get out and enjoy.

"There's enough going on this time of year that cost people a lot of money, but this is just a nice, family friendly event," she said. "One of the houses runs a hot cocoa stand and this year The Good Life Market is going to be giving out cookies. So people can make a couple of stops along the way and get little goodies as they go."

But the highlight, of course, will be viewing the houses in Raymond and seeing how they're decked out for the holidays.

Last year one of the houses had their lights synced up to music, Sawyer said, and in some years several neighboring houses in Raymond participate in the contest together. One house on Pond Road goes all out in particular and has won the contest multiple times.

"I really appreciate the vastness of the decorations that they put out," she said. "It's really impressive what people will do for their displays."

There's a variety of reasons people participate in the contest, she said.

Some are just competition "and they try to be the best. Sometimes they just want to be part of this fun holiday event. I've heard from others that that their grandkids came and helped decorate and they had so much much

fun putting up the lights."

There is still time for those interested in having their home in the contest to participate. The deadline to sign up to participate is Dec. 6.

For those who participate, winning doesn't just include bragging rights but also prizes, which have ranged from cash to gift certificates. This year, Sawyer said, she wants to show appreciation to all participants so everyone in the contest will get something.



Once the duo founded the company in 2024, they realized they had talented dancers to fill the roles and develop a full performance. They began writing in January of that year, and spent almost two years in completing a script and patching the music together.

"I searched the bowels of the internet to find all these different, random songs that somehow worked together to tell a story," Pelletier-Guerrette added.

In addition to a varied musical score, the show also will feature multiple dance styles, from classical ballet to musical theatre and jazz, and even includes acrobatic tricks.

"The Candy Cane dance has all the crazy acrobatic skills, the tumbling, and lifts," Pelletier said. "That one is very exciting."

"We work with so many students who are not just ballerinas", Pelletier-Guerrette said. "They train in many different styles of dance, so we wanted to put together a show that felt like The Nutcracker, in that it is all the themes of Christmas and the holidays, but incorporates those styles of dance that our students spend so much time

The Nutcracker is a tale both Pelletier and Pelletier-Guerrette are very familiar with, as they are each principal dancers with the Maine State Ballet. Pelletier will be performing in the play again this year, in addition to directing the new show for the company.

The different dance styles will also help those who are unfamiliar with ballet or hesitant to attend a ballet performance become more comfortable with all types of dance.

"Part of our goal with this show is to soft launch into ballet," Pelletier-Guerrette said. "There is a lot of serious dancing in this show, of a very high caliber, but it's interspersed with moments of play acting where these characters you know come out and talk and narrate the story.

"What we're seeing that it's very approachable," she said. "Anyone can go see this show and enjoy it and not necessarily need to be in the arts community to get it."

The show will also hopefully help connect new people to the expression that is found through dancing.

"I think it's [dance] something that's human, something that in my opinion is one of the most genuine forms of self-expression," Pelletier added. "It's a way of connecting with people and human nature and story-



telling that we don't get in other forms

The cast of 60 dancers will range in age from four to professional adults, with the duo pulling from the Center's students to complete the cast. Previous performances have been smaller, but this show has opened the opportunity to involve more children, including Pelletier-Guerrette's own son as the youngest performer.

Family is very close to the pair, as the sisters work with their mother, Beth, to run both the company and the center.

"This is a family effort," Pelletier said, explaining how the sisters are able to take care of their personal lives while depending on the other to run the business, something especially helpful as Pelletier-Guerrette is expecting her third child in early spring.

"It's a constant balance between the two of us, making it all work," she said. "If she needs someone to lean on, I can be that person, and I know when it is my turn, she'll be there for me as well."

The family support will be essential as the center expands in a new location in the North Windham Shopping Center, behind Windham Jewelers. The move is expected to be completed in February 2026.





WHS grad rises above hardship to her achieve dream

Windham High School 2021 graduate Bria Campobasso graduated during a rough time. Campobasso was a multi-sport athlete cheering and playing lacrosse. COVID-19 had ended the previous year's spring season, and schools and athletes were still dealing with its ramifications. COVID-19 completely reshaped Campobasso's plans. She had planned to attend college, but with circumstances as they were, realized it wasn't the right environment for her. She did not let this stop her; she used this setback as a chance to focus on her health, discipline and long-term goals.

This led her to develop a real passion for bodybuilding and competing where she's been able to excel professionally. She graduated online with her degree in personal training and nutrition from the International Sports Sciences Association.

"After high school, I discovered my love for the gym and weightlifting and found it was a great outlet from transitioning (from) a multi-sport athlete to no sports," said Campobasso. "I fell in love with the gym and wanted to take it to the next level."

As a Windham senior, Campobasso was asked by former Windham Athletic Director Rich Drummond along with a small group of athletes to speak on behalf of athletes and classmates in a ZOOM Windham Town Hall meeting about the importance of athletics, during the initial years of the pandemic. She spoke

about how important it was to participate in a physical activity and a feeling of normalcy during a detrimental time. Campobasso was honored to have been chosen for this.

High school athletes were eventually given more freedom and sports and practices were able to resume.

After discovering her passion for bodybuilding, Campobasso got involved with the Organization of Competition Bodies and entering competitive bodybuilding events.

"As I trained and learned more about the sport, and my coaches and I came to the decision that the OCB would be a great Federation for me to start my journey," said Campobasso. "After two years of being in

'prep' I entered my first show in New Hampshire in 2022, and that experience really solidified my interest in competing at a higher level."

During that first competition, Campobasso placed first in two out of her three categories and placed second in her third category.

Campobasso said the off-season is

about building muscle. Some of the preparation for competition includes lifting heavy, eating enough to grow, and improving weak areas that the judges give feedback on. Once preparation begins, training becomes more targeted. She lifts six to seven days a week, but with more emphasis on shaping, symmetry, and conditioning. As it gets closer to a competition, cardio increases, nutrition becomes more precise, and everything is done with the goal of bringing your

best physique to the stage. Campobasso said it's one of the most disciplined things anyone could ever go through.

In March 2024 Campobasso won her OCB Bikini Pro title.

"I won my OCB Bikini Pro title by outworking everyone," said Campobasso. "I showed up every day, stayed disciplined, and brought a physique to the stage that proved it. It wasn't luck — it was years of grind, sacrifice, and refusing to quit."

Her advice to athletes who encounter adversity is your journey isn't over, it just means it's changing. Setbacks can feel huge in the moment, but they can also push you to-

ward opportunities you never expected. Stay disciplined, stay open-minded, and trust a new direction can still lead to success.

She's taking a lengthy offseason to give her body more time to build muscle and get ready for the stage. 
"We didn't really get to process it," said Joly. "To come back together and relive it, my heart is so warm and full from being here with everyone again. This ceremony is everything I thought

Busy Day Soup

This easy soup recipe takes very little effort but don't let that fool you. This flavorful soup is loaded with lots of vegetables, tender pasta, and ground beef. It can be easily customized to fit whatever flavors you're in the mood for, or you can use our tried-and-true combinatio for an instant family favorite!

> Prep Time: 8 minutes ~ Cook Time: 30 minutes Serves: 6

INGREDIENTS

1 pound of lean ground beef 1 packet of onion soup mix 6 cups of beef stock

1 28-ounce can of petite diced tomatoes 2 cups of frozen mixed vegetables 1 cup of uncooked ditalini pasta or any small pasta or rice 1 bay leaf

1 teaspoon of black pepper 1/2 teaspoon of kosher salt

INSTRUCTIONS

In a large soup pot or Dutch oven, cook the ground beef over medium-high heat. Drain the fat off the beef and return it to the pot.

Add the onion soup mix, beef stock, and petite diced tomatoes. Bring the soup to a boil. Reduce the temperature to medium heat and let the soup simmer for 15 minutes. Add the pasta and vegetables and cook for an additional 15 minutes, or until the pasta is tender. Taste and adjust seasoning as needed. I often add a little bit of extra black pepper.


